Elizabeth Eleanor Gray was born in Albany, Linn County, Oregon, Jan. 13, 1860. The early part of her childhood was spent in the Willamette valley. Later she moved with her parents to Malheur County where she

taught school. From there they moved to Boise, Idaho. On returning to Oregon, she entered University of Oregon in the year 1878, attending until the fall of 1878. On December 22, 1878, she was married to William Boone Emmons of Goshen, Oregon. To this union were born twelve children, who with her husband survive her and who were with her during her last illness. They are: Mrs. Sadie Smith of Corvallis, Keeler Emmons, Mrs. L. Boring, Victor Emmons, Mrs. Carrie Kelley, Horace, Oma, Alton, Roy and Cecil Emmons, of Beaverton, Freeland R. and James Emmons of Portland. She was well known and loved around Beaverton, having spent the last twenty one years of her life here.
