Household Dett.

Fruit Layer Cake—1-3 cup of shortening, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 cup milk, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 2 cups flour, one teaspoon vanilla extract, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Cream shortening well, add sugar, add the yolk of an egg, and the vanilla. Mix well, add the milk, then the flour and baking powder which have been sifted together. Mix in the beaten white of egg. Bake in three greased layer tins in quick oven about 15 minutes. Put together with fruit filling.

Fruit Filling—1 1/2 cups water, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, one half cup fruit jelly, 1/2 cup of raisins, 1/2 pound chopped figs, juice of 1/2 lemon, 1/2 cup of chopped blanched almonds or other nuts, 2 tablespoons sugar. Cook jelly with the water, fruit and sugar several minutes. Add the cornstarch, which has been dissolved in a little cold water. Cook slowly until thick, and remove from fire, add nuts and lemon juice, cool, and spread it between the layers of cake.

Icing—1 1/2 cups confectioner's sugar, 1/2 teaspoon butter, 2 tablespoons hot milk, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract. Add the butter to the hot milk and add the sugar slowly to make paste the right consistency to spread. Add vanilla and spread on top and sides of cake. If desired place halves of English walnuts on top of cake while the icing is still soft.

Chocolate Layer Cake—1-3 of a cup of shortening, one cup sugar, one egg, one cup milk, 1 1/2 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract. Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, beating well; add the beaten egg; one half the milk and mix well; add one half the flour which has been sifted with salt and baking powder; add the rest of the milk, then remainder of flour and flavoring; beat after each addition. Bake in moderate oven 15 or 20 minutes. Put together with Chocolate filling and icing.

Chocolate Filling and Icing—3 cups confectioner's sugar, a little boiling water, one teaspoon vanilla extract, two ounces unsweetened chocolate (2 squares), 1/2 teaspoon grated orange peel. To sugar add boiling water very slowly to make a smooth paste; add vanilla, melted chocolate, and orange peel. Spread between layers and on top of cake.

Sunshine Cake—3 tablespoons shortening, 1/2 cup sugar, yolks of three eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla or lemon extract, 1/2 cup milk, 1 1/2 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder. Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, and yolks of eggs which have been beaten until thick; add flavoring; sift together flour and baking powder and add alternately, a little at a time, with the milk, to the

first mixture. Bake in a greased loaf pan in a moderate oven 35 to 45 minutes. Cover with white icing.

Gingerbread—Two eggs, one cup of butter, one cup of brown sugar, one cup of molasses, one cup of scalded milk, one teaspoonful soda stirred into the molasses, four cups flour, two tablespoons ginger, adding two teaspoons baking powder to the flour. When taken from the oven, spread with one teaspoon butter creamed with maple molasses.

Cocoa Waffles—2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1 tablespoon cocoa, 2 tablespoons melted shortening, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Beat egg-yolks with the salt. Add milk, cocoa, sugar, shortening, and the flour, baking-powder and salt sifted together. Lastly fold in the whites of the eggs beaten stiff. Serve with cocoa syrup.

FARM REMINDERS

Putting all the pullets into the laying house at one time is not so effective as putting an advance guard of one fourth the total number in first. These pullets if placed in the house two or three days in advance of the main flock, will learn to use the roosts. When the rest of the flock is put into the house this advance guard will show the others how to use the roosts. When the rest of the flock is put in at once, crowding in the corners even with mature pullets is not uncommon.

Honey is first collected from the flowers by the bee in the form of a thin nectar, consisting of about 60 per cent water and 40 per cent sugar. Two changes take place in nectar to form honey. The bees concentrate the sugar by evaporating the water, and thus improve the flavor. A chemical change takes place similar to the process that goes on in the human stomach after cane sugar has been eaten. As a result the sugar is in a form that can be easily absorbed by the most particular digestive system.

OVERFEEDING PULLETS IS A BIG MISTAKE
Overfeeding pullets just coming into production is a mistake to be avoided according to the findings of the Oregon station. If the pullets have free access to dry mash, then the grain feed should be divided and fed morning and evening, or better still, all they will clean up in the morning in two hours and enough at night to leave a little in the litter when they go to roost, is about right. The busy pullet well fed but not overfed is the pullet that lays.
