## "HOME AGAIN, WIN AGAIN"

"Home Again, Win Again," is the rallying cry taken up by the greatest body of "homecomers" in O. A. C. history now trekking back for the annual get-together and football battle for the championship of the state. Advance seat sales exceed all previous records.

In the game where "dope" in the past has meant little in the final result, "dope" is nevertheless unusually even this year. Both teams have had to learn new systems of football this season under new coaches. Both are deficient in veteran players, but possessed of worlds of fight. Both have met with both success and reverses during the season, and comparative scores give little edge to either camp.

The Aggies are not unmindful that last year they triumphed over their ancient foes, and broke forever, they think, the so-called 10-year jinx. They're determined to force a victory this year and maintain in the future the supremacy in football that they have enjoyed over Oregon in baseball, wrestling, track, and most other sports.

Regardless of the weather, some 20,000 persons may be seated in comfort in the huge stadium since the completion of the second unit. This was built by the board of control and is being paid for out of gate receipts.

All Oregon editors have been invited to attend the big game and those who accepted before November 10 will be seated in a body.

## FARM REMINDERS

The acreage of Oregon clover for 1925 will be short, reports to the O. A. C. experiment station indicate. Many new fields will be planted in February for hay and for seed. Especial care should be taken to avoid buckhorn and dodder. Practically no clover has dodder in western Oregon, but a lot of it contains buckhorn. It costs from 60 cents to \$1.25 a bushel to have red clover cleaned reasonably free from buckhorn. This is often 10 per cent of the cost of the clover, a heavy loss to the grower.

Successful Oregon poultrymen check up on brooder and incubator equipment now. Spare parts, worn out or broken parts can be conveniently ordered. Thermometers, thermostats, and hygrometers are often ordered from the factory. To order at the last minute needed repairs is a policy that results in poor service and unfilled orders. To order earlier saves delay and disappointment.

Western Oregon can export and feed many thousands of bushels of Hannechen barley. The production has never met the consumption, let alone the export demand. Hannechen barley planted in March or early April is usually a better yielder than spring oats or spring barley.

VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPIES AND SUGGESTIONS

**Three-Egg Angel Cake**—1 cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1-3 teaspoon salt, 2-3 cup scalded milk, 1 teaspoon almond or vanilla extract, whites of three eggs. Mix and sift first five ingredients four times. Add milk very slowly, while still hot, beating continually; add vanilla; mix well and fold in whites of eggs beaten until light. Turn into ungreased angel cake tin and bake in very slow oven about 45 minutes. Remove from oven; invert pan and allow to stand until cold. Cover top and sides with icing.

**Cocoa Gingerbread**—1 cup of molasses, 1/2 cup sour milk, 3 tablespoons fat, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cold water, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 5 tablespoons cocoa, 2 cups flour. Mix molasses and sour milk. Add fat and the soda dissolved in the cold water. Add dry ingredients. Pour into cake tins and bake about twenty minutes in a moderate oven. This may be covered with an icing before serving, if desired.

**Cinnamon Bun**—2 1/4 cups of flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons shortening, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 4 tablespoons seeded raisins, 1/4 cup water, 1 egg. Take 2 tablespoons from the measured sugar and sift with the flour, salt and baking powder into a bowl; rub shortening in very lightly with the tips of the fingers; add beaten egg to water; and add slowly; roll out one-third of an inch thick on a floured board; brush with a little melted butter, sprinkle with sugar, cinnamon and raisins which have been washed and drained. Roll as for jelly roll; cut into one and one-half inch pieces; place with cut edges up in a well-greased pan; sprinkle with a little sugar and cinnamon and bake in moderate oven for thirty or thirty-five minutes. Remove from pan at once.

**Almond Cake**—1/4 cup butter or butter substitute, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup condensed milk, 1/2 cup chopped almonds, 1 1/4 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 3 egg whites. Cream butter and sugar. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt, add liquid alternately with dry ingredients to butter and sugar, then add extract and chopped almonds. Add cream of tartar to the partially beaten egg whites and beat until stiff. Fold into cake mixture. Spread 1/2 inch thick on a buttered pan and bake in a moderate oven. Cut in squares and cover with boiled frosting. Decorate with fruit or nuts.

**Fig and Nut Sandwiches**—1/2 cup butter or substitute, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1/2 cup chopped figs, 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon of vanilla, 1/2 cup chopped nuts, 1/2 cup condensed milk. Cream butter and sugar, add beaten egg. Sift baking powder and flour, add alternately with milk to the butter mixture. Roll 1/2 inch thick. Cover one-half the mixture with chopped figs and nuts, fold the other half over and press the two pieces together. Cut in strips one-half inch wide and three inches long.

**Sugar Cookies**—1/2 cup butter or substitute, one cup sugar, 1 egg, 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon of vanilla, 1/2 cup condensed milk. Cream butter and sugar, add the beaten egg. Sift baking powder and flour, add alternately with milk to the butter mixture. Roll 1/2 inch thick, cut in squares, diamonds or round shapes. Decorate with nuts, fruits, or a few raisins.

C. station has found a solution of tincture of iodine or silver nitrate to be best for individual treatment. The bird's nostrils, mouth and throat can be cleaned with a feather or a cotton swab, and the infected parts painted with one of these solutions.
