IMPRESSIVE SERMON

GIVEN SUNDAY

Rev. Blakely, of the Community Baptist Church of Aloha, Ore., in his Thanksgiving sermon last Sunday, wove an impressive story of true American history, covering the topic of the sermon, "Thanksgiving," around a beautiful brooch. This brooch is the valuable possession of one of his parishioners, Mrs. Prink, a direct descendant of Peregrine White, the first white child to be born in New England.

Peregrine White's mother, Mrs. Susannah White, was one of the Pilgrims who sailed on the Mayflower from Plymouth, Holland, on the 6th of September, 1620, and on December 21, 1620, landed and founded the colony of Plymouth, Massachusetts.

Soon after their arrival Mrs. Susannah White became the wife of Mr. Edward Winslow, who was delegated by his associates to treat with the Indians in the vicinity, and succeeded in winning the friendship of their chief, Massasoit. Mr. Winslow was Governor of the colony from 1633 to 1637 and from 1644 to 1645.

This was the first marriage in the New England colonies.

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ACREAGE PRODUCTS

For some time the products of the rich alluvial soil around and about Beaverton have been moving very rapidly. Three or four freight cars are often seen these days on the sidetracks near the depot being loaded with different products some of which go as far east as Omaha before reshipment.

Probably few people hereabouts realize that celery is exported by the carload. Five freight cars have been filled in the past few days and dispatched to different points. Three of them, which were loaded by the Griesel Fruit Company, go to Omaha, Nebraska, to be reshipped there. Some of the celery is grown on the lowlands near Shadduck while some of it is grown northwest of town.

A total of nine cars of potatoes have been dispatched in the last few days. Five cars were purchased by Burnett & Son of Portland from local growers. Three cars were loaded by F. Dose, who sent them to different places. One car was loaded by McKinley Mitchell.

Onions have taken first place for a long time in products of this vicinity and several people have been able to acquire a stake and retire from the proceeds of their onion patch. To date, however, only one car of onions has been shipped out. This car was loaded by W. A. Swank, who will probably return later and purchase more of the odorous bulbs.
