A GOOD PICTURE IS NEVER OLD

The following is a story written by J. Charles Davis, general manager of J. J. Fleming Productions, Inc. Mr. Davis is located at the office of the Fleming Productions at 723 Seventh Avenue, New York City.

"The marketing of pictures on the so-called 'Independent Market' presents an always interesting study and one that never ceases to attract for the reason that it is as ever-changing as the sea. It is always just a little bit ahead of the 'regular' market or the national distributor.

"It has to be to survive, and the truth of this is easily seen if one will but take the trouble to go back over the history of the motion picture business.

"The great innovations of the industry have come through the Independents just as the great box-office attractions have been Independent pictures. The national releasing organizations have been contented to let well enough alone. It may be remarked in passing, however, that some of the national companies have not hesitated to follow the success of the Independents.

"It is the Independent who has the courage of his convictions which makes him reach out and risk his all on what he firmly believes to be the right road.

"There is now and always will be an Independent market. Nothing can stop that. It can and will be improved.

Now right here is where the exhibitor is all wrong. Like a book that is new until it is read, a picture is new until it has been played in that particular city. The great authors of the past are read by each succeeding generation. In fact, the sale of their works increase year by year.

"If a picture is a good picture and has been successful in certain parts of the country it is reasonable to believe that it will be successful in other parts although released a great deal later.

"I will venture to say that the average exhibitor can make himself some real money today by looking around his Independent exchanges and booking some good pictures which have never been shown in his territory."

VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Griddle Cake—1 1/2 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 egg, 1 1/4 cups milk, 1 tablespoonful shortening. Mix and sift dry ingredients into bowl. Add milk, the melted shortening, and beaten egg. Beat well and bake on a slightly greased very hot griddle. Turn the cakes over only once.

Butterscotch Layer Cake—1/2 cup butter or other shortening, 1 cup sugar, 2-3 cups milk, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon vanilla or other flavoring extract. Cream the shortening well, add sugar slowly and then the yolks of the eggs, which have been well beaten. Add milk, a very little at a time. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and mix with the first ingredients. Add the flavoring and fold in the beaten whites of eggs, and bake in two greased layer tins in a moderate oven for about 25 minutes.

Butterscotch Filling and Icing—2 cups light syrup, 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup milk. Boil the syrup, butter and milk together until it forms a soft ball when tested in cold water. Cool a little without stirring and pour while warm on the cake. Chopped nuts may be added while icing is still soft.

Cocoa Cake—1/2 cup fat, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 1/4 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 3 tablespoons cocoa, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Cream fat and sugar. Mix dry ingredients and add alternately with milk. Fold in egg-whites beaten well, and add vanilla. Bake in layers or a loaf. Any desired icing may be used with this cake.

Waffle Yea Cakes—Make a batter of 1 tablespoon butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 2 eggs, a pinch of salt, a few drops of some preferred flavoring, 1 cup flour, and 2 teaspoons baking powder. Have the iron hot and well greased. Put about half as much batter in the center of the iron as you would in making a waffle, and bake as you would with a waffle. These make delicious little fresh cakes to serve with tea.

American Salad—Fill small greased molds half-full of canned peas. Cover with cold boiled rice which has been seasoned with finely minced pimiento, parsley, and onion-juice. Press the rice in lightly to fill the mold. Loosen with a knife or spatula and turn out on a salad plate garnished with lettuce of parsley. Serve with French or Mayonnaise dressing.

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Rice and Prune Pudding—Cook rice until done, the same as you would for the table, with a little salt. Cook prunes until soft, or use canned prunes. Then take the fruit out of the liquor, remove the pits and mash the prunes. Coat the inside of a pudding dish with butter, put in first a layer of rice, then a layer of the prunes, and so on until the dish is filled, having rice for the last layer. Sprinkle 2 tablespoonfuls of sugar over the top, and a tablespoonful of cinnamon. Then add the juice that the prunes were cooked in. Bake 10 minutes in a quick oven. Either a liquid or a hard sauce may be used. Three-quarters of a cup of rice and 2 cupfuls of prunes will make, when cooked, about the right proportions for a pudding large enough for six people.

Fruit Cake—Two cups brown sugar, one cup molasses, one cup butter or other shortening, one cup sour milk, one cup of coffee, four eggs well beaten, one teaspoon ground nutmeg, one teaspoon cloves, two teaspoons soda dissolved in water, two raisins carefully washed and added to 5 cups of flour, shaking well into the flour. Bake in two good-sized loaf tins, with a slow fire, for at least an hour.

ORDINANCE NO. 100

AN ORDINANCE to provide the carrying into effect in the Town of Beaverton, Washington County, Oregon, the initiative and referendum powers reserved to the legal voters of municipalities by Section 1-A of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon; to enact, initiate and refer legislation and to enact and amend their municipal charters reserved to legal voters to cities and towns by Section 2 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and providing for violation of this act and repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith and declaring an emergency.

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The following shall be substantially the form of a petition for any ordinance or amendment to the charter proposed by the initiative.

WARNING

It is a felony for any one to sign any Initiative or Referendum petition with any other name than his own, or to knowingly sign his name more than once for the same measure, or to sign such petition when he is not a legal voter.

To the Honorable Recorder for the Town of Beaverton, Washington County, Oregon.

We, the undersigned, citizens and legal voters of the Town of Beaverton, Washington County, Oregon, respectfully demand that the following proposed ordinance (or amendment to the city charter), shall be submitted to the legal voters of the Town of Beaverton, Washington County, Oregon, for their approval or rejection at the regular (or special) city election to be held on the _____ day of _____, 19____, and each for himself says: I have personally signed this petition; I am a legal voter of the Town of Beaverton, Washington County, Oregon, and my residence and street number are correctly written after my name.

SECTION 2. The following shall be substantially the form of petition for referendum to the people on any ordinance passed by the City Council.

WARNING

It is a felony for any one to sign any Initiative or Referendum petition with any other name than his own, or to knowingly sign his name more than once for the same measure, or to sign such petition when he is not a legal voter.
