CREAMERYMEN MEET IN PORTLAND NEXT YEAR

The 1925 meeting of the National Creamery Buttermakers' Association will be at Portland. It will afford a wonderful opportunity for Oregon creamerymen to come in contact with some of the better authorities of the country.

Oregon now produces annually a four million pound surplus of butter and is in dire need of a steady and profitable market, since she was herself importing nearly half the butter she used and markets have dropped behind production. To hold such a market the creamerymen must improve the quality and turn out a uniform product of good flavor.

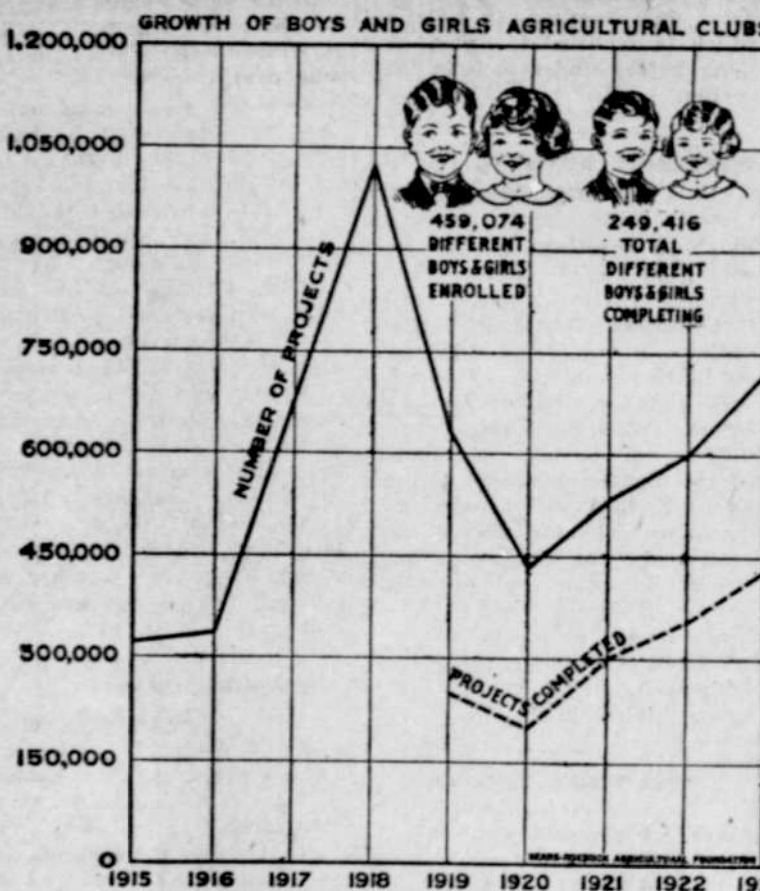
"It is difficult to go into the butter markets today and buy even one hundred pounds of good butter," says Professor V. E. Chappell of O. A. C., secretary-treasurer of the Oregon Buttermakers' Association. "This means better cream, as good butter cannot be made from stale, off-flavor cream. First grade cream is worth more than poor cream and provision should be made for paying more for it."

To those who object that they are paying all the fat is worth now, Chappell says, "Let's lower the standard." If ordinary sour cream making 90 point butter, brings 35 cents, then for top notch cream making 92 point pay 38 cents, and for cream that will not make 90 point pay 25 to 30 cents. Just one ten-cent cut will be enough to bring the producer to time and make him take better care of his cream.

"If a producer will not be talked into better cream, then let him sell his off-grade stuff to your competitor," Chappell suggests. "Either way, you are the winner. If we can all get together and pay on the same basis, we will get as much cream as we do now. And we'll have something to show the big convention."

Junior Farmers Need Club Leaders



That club leadership must be increased properly to train the boys and girls of the nation who decide to remain on farms and become the bulwark of American agriculture is shown in a survey of the club work of the junior farmers just completed by Benjamin H. Darrow, director of the boys' and girls' club work of the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation.

According to the report of the Foundation, based on a count by the Department of Agriculture, 722,408 projects were begun in 1923 by 459,074 boys and girls, a number which is less than 6 per cent of the farm youth of the nation of club age. Of these projects 429,746 were completed by 249,416 club members. Girls completing their work outnumber the boys three to two, there being 150,194 girls and 99,222 boys. The report also indicates that 55.6 per cent of the enrolled girls finished their projects, while only 52.9 per cent of the boys completed theirs. The high point reached in 1918, as shown by the accompanying chart, was due to the expansion of club work in connection with the slogan of the day: "Food will win the war." After the crisis was over there was retrenchment and club work suffered.

"Many of the 8,000,000 boys and girls engaged in club work hope to leave the farm," said Darrow, "but 80 per cent of them will remain in the country, experience has shown. All who stay on the farm should have the benefit of the inspiration and training club work affords. If we are to provide this for the junior farmers of the nation, we must rapidly increase the number of county club leaders."

Eric W. Allen, dean of the University of Oregon school of Journalism, will serve during the coming year as honorary president of Sigma Delta Chi, national journalism fraternity, an organization which has 38 chapters in as many American universities and colleges and a total graduate and undergraduate membership of 3720.

Dean Allen, who was elected this week at the annual convention held at Bloomington and Indianapolis, Indiana, succeeded James Wright Brown, publisher of Editor and Publisher, as honorary national president. It is the second national office to which he has been elected. He served a year ago as president of the American Association of Schools and Departments of Journalism.

George F. Pierrot, graduate of the University of Washington school of Journalism, was named national president of the organization. Pierrot is acting managing editor of the American Boy and was formerly a member of the staff of the Seattle Times. The University of Oregon chapter of Sigma Delta Chi was represented at the convention by Theodore James of Portland.
