Put Her Foot in It

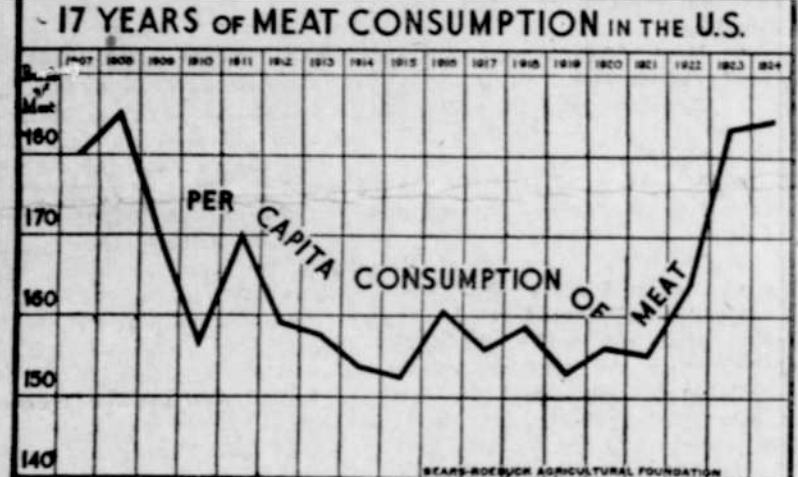

She remarked, "Yes, that is so, but I am one exception—we have no relatives here outside our immediate family—you may gossip to me about anyone."

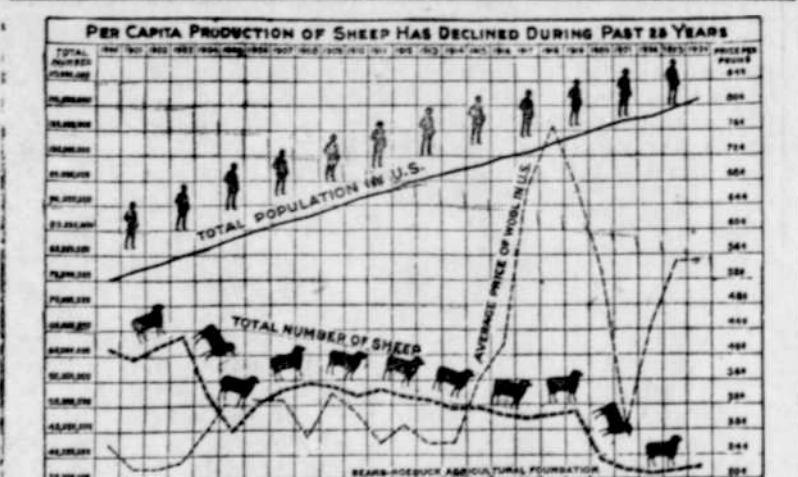
"Well, the people I want most to gossip about are some newweds—don't know their name, but she calls him 'Darling Donalee dear,' and they are too silly to be around sane people."

More meat and lard was consumed per capita in 1923 than in any other year since 1908. This increase in consumption was primarily in pork and lard. According to the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, in addition to providing the amount needed for domestic consumption, enough meat and lard was produced to export over two billion pounds, which is equivalent to about 18 pounds more per capita. As pork production is now being curtailed, the 1924 figure of meat consumption is not likely to be equaled in 1925.

Bright Outlook for Sheep



The sheep industry presents one of the bright spots in the present agricultural outlook, according to the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation. The number of sheep in the United States has been increased for two years, but is still far from being back at wartime or pre-war figures.

The United States produces only about 10 per cent of the world's total wool crop, but consumes 25 per cent of it. World carry-over stocks of wool have been shrinking for four years and are now low. World production last year was 96 million pounds below the 1914 level.

The prices of both wool and lambs have been strong the past two years and the outlook for reasonable profits in sheep is excellent for several years to come.

VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Walnut and Raisin Stuffing—One-half cup raisins, one-half cup walnut meats, 2 cups stale bread crumbs, 1 teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, 1-4 teaspoon ground sage, 1 tablespoon melted butter, one-half cup hot milk. Cut the raisins in pieces, break up the bread crumbs and mix with the butter and seasonings. Melt the butter in the hot milk and mix thoroughly with the other ingredients. Stuff your Xmas fowl with this delectable stuffing.

Prune Stuffing—One-half cup prunes, three-fourths cup hot prune liquid, two cups of soft bread crumbs, one teaspoon of salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, one eighth teaspoon of cinnamon, 1-16 teaspoon allspice, one tablespoon lemon juice, 2 tablespoons melted butter. Soak the prunes overnight in cold water to cover, and cook in the same liquid until tender, but not soft. Drain, reserving 3-cups of the liquid to moisten the dressing. Remove pits and cut prunes in pieces. Mix the prunes with crumbs, seasonings, and lemon juice, and moisten with butter and prune liquid.

Sausage Stuffing—One-half tablespoon fat, 2 tablespoons of chopped onion, one cup sausage, one cup hot water, one-half cup chopped almonds, two cups soft bread crumbs, one-half teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon sage, one-fourth teaspoon pepper. Melt the fat, add the onion and sausage and cook until the sausage browns, stirring frequently. Cool, add water and

almonds, crumbs and seasonings.

San Francisco Stuffing—One-half cup cranberries, 2 tablespoons olive oil, one small onion, 2 tablespoons of chopped green pepper, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup stewed tomatoes, one-half cup raisins, 2 cups soft bread crumbs. Cut the cranberries in halves, place in a strainer, and wash out seeds by running cold water over them. Heat the olive oil, add the chopped onion, green pepper, and salt, and cook over a low fire two minutes. Add the tomatoes, cranberries and raisins; cover and cook slowly ten minutes. Remove from the fire, and add the crumbs.

California Onion Stuffing—1 cup chopped onion, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 3 tablespoons of melted butter, three-fourths of a teaspoon of salt, one-fourth teaspoon pepper, 1-8 teaspoon sage, a few grains of cayenne pepper, 1-2 cup strained stewed tomato. Mix the onion, crumbs, melted butter, and seasonings. Add the tomato, and use for stuffing your Christmas fowl.

Oyster and Almond Stuffing—2 cups oysters, 2 cups stale bread crumbs, 3-4 cup chopped almonds, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 3-4 cup oyster liquor and hot water, 3 tablespoons butter. Drain the oysters and cut in pieces. Add the almonds, crumbs, seasonings and lemon juice. Strain and beat the oyster liquor, and, if necessary, add hot water to make correct proportions. Melt the

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butter in this liquid and add to other ingredients.

Almond Stuffing—1 cup stale bread crumbs, 2 cups almonds, 3 tablespoons butter, 1-2 teaspoon of salt, 1-4 teaspoon of pepper, 1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley, 1-2 cup hot water. Blanch the almonds by pouring boiling water over them and allowing them to stand until skins slip off easily. Dry thoroughly, chop, add all other ingredients, and use for stuffing turkey or goose or chicken.
