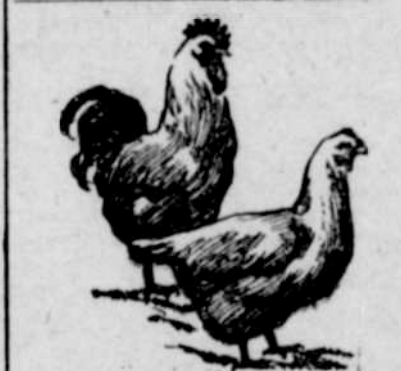
How He Accomplished It
