WINTER WHEAT PLANTING IS MADE SAFER

Earlier planting of wheat to replace crops frozen out in the late cold spell is apparently rendered justifiable by use of copper carbonate treatment for the seed, field observations at the Oregon experiment station show. Winter wheat like the White Winter or Wilhelmina—sometimes called Holland—after being treated with copper car-

bonate may safely be planted in January or early February. Also such varieties as Rink and also Popsy.

In this way many of the farmers having on hand a supply of winter wheat may save the heavy expense of buying the spring varieties for these earlier plantings. For later plantings the spring varieties are the best.

Copper carbonate treated wheat appears to retain its vitality under wet, cold conditions longer than wheat given the usual formaldehyde treatment. Common experience has shown that much of the wheat treated with formaldehyde has rotted, this stands resulting. The wheat treated with copper carbonate on the other hand appears to remain active and alive rather a long time even in cold and wet soils.

Treatment of neither oats nor barley with copper carbonate has been successful in the control of smut.

POULTRY BUSINESS

HURT BY PANIC

That the shipping of day-old chicks across state lines will not be affected by the quarantine and embargo regulations against the fowl plague is the assurance to Oregon poultry breeders given by the O. A. C. experiment station.

The fowl pest has caused consternation and actual loss in middle western states and in some states further east, said Dr. B. T. Simms, head of the veterinary medicine department. It has not appeared in any state as far west as the Rocky mountains so far as known. Unfounded reports tend to throw panic into some poultry growers and damage the breeders correspondingly.

Dr. L. F. Pelton, state veterinarian of Washington, has advised Dr. Simms that the regulations made by that state do not apply to day-old chicks. The same may be said of the California regulations, and as far as known, of those of Idaho and other states.

VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Marble Cake—(White part) Three tablespoonfuls shortening, one-half cup sugar, one-half teaspoon lemon extract, one-half cup milk, one cup flour, two teaspoonfuls baking powder, one-fourth teaspoon of salt, and the white of an egg. Cream shortening, add sugar slowly, add flavoring and milk. Beat well and add flour, which was sifted with baking powder and salt. Mix in beaten white of egg. Put in greased pan.

Dark part—Three tablespoonfuls shortening, one-half cup of sugar, yolk of one egg, one-half cup milk, one-half teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoonful cloves, one-half teaspoonful allspice, one teaspoon cinnamon, six teaspoonfuls cocoa. Cream shortening; add sugar slowly; add egg yolk and mix well. Mix in milk; add flour, baking powder, salt and spices which have been sifted together. Put this batter by spoonfuls into the white part after it is in the pan; do not stir. Bake three-quarters of an hour in a moderate oven.

Icing—One and one-half cups confectioner's sugar, two tablespoonfuls hot milk, one-half teaspoon hot milk; one-half teaspoon butter, one-half teaspoon vanilla. Add butter slowly to hot milk and add sugar slowly to make paste of the right consistency to spread. Add vanilla and spread on top and sides of cake.

Coconut Icing—Boil one cup of sugar in one-third cup of coconut milk until a drop hardens in cold water. Remove from fire—have white of egg beaten thoroughly—then add a little at a time, the sugar syrup, heating constantly. Spread between cake and on top sprinkle with coconut, which has been thoroughly pressed from milk and in which two tablespoonfuls of sugar have been stirred. For marshmallow icing, double the quantity of water and add six or eight marshmallows.

Chocolate Cream—One-third cup shortening, one cup sugar, one cup milk, one and three-fourths cups flour, four teaspoonfuls baking powder, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one tea-

poon vanilla, one egg. Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, beaten egg, one-half of the milk, and then mix well. Add one-half the flour which has been sifted with the salt and baking powder, the rest of the milk; then the rest of the flour and add flavoring. Bake in 2 greased layer cake tins in moderate oven 15 or 20 minutes.

Chocolate Icing—Two cups of confectioner's sugar, a little of boiling water, one teaspoon of

vanilla, one and one-half ozs. unsweetened chocolate, one-half teaspoon grated orange peel. To the sugar add boiling water very slowly to make a smooth paste. Add vanilla, the melted chocolate, and orange peel. Spread on top of each layer and put cake together with slightly sweetened whipped cream.

Moist Spice Cake—Cream 1/4 cup butter or substitute, add

one cup brown sugar gradually and then two well-beaten eggs. Mix and sift one and one-half cups of flour with one-fourth teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon cloves, one-eighth teaspoon cinnamon and one-half teaspoon soda. Add one-half cup chopped raisins and add alternately with one-half cup buttermilk or clabbered milk to the first mixture. Bake in a moderate oven. Cover with icing made as follows: Beat two egg whites until stiff, add one tablespoonful of vinegar, one tablespoonful cornstarch, one-half teaspoon lemon extract and two cups confectioner's sugar and then beat it constantly until it is stiff.

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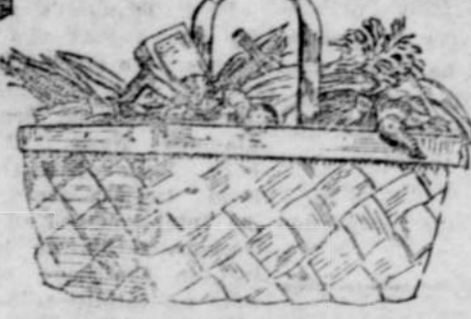
