BORDEAUX MIXTURE DESTROYS DISEASE

Peach leaf curl, exceedingly destructive to some varieties of Oregon peaches such as the Elberta, is best controlled in the winter. This disease cannot be controlled after it has once appeared, but it can be completely prevented by a spray applied in the winter time. The spray, bordeaux mixture—6-6-50—must be applied before the buds open. To insure success the application should not be made later than the second week of February, says H. P. Barnes, plant pathologist at the experiment station. Lime sulfur spray is occasionally fairly satisfactory, but at times does not give perfect control. The station at Corvallis gives preference to the bordeaux spray as it has proved itself to be the better spray in experiments conducted at the station.

SPRAY PROGRAM READY FOR GROWERS

The benefit of the latest information on economic and satisfactory control of orchard pests in Oregon is offered to growers in the new revised spray program now ready for distribution. Spray practice for both western and eastern Oregon are explained, and where conditions make it necessary, additional explanations are given for southern Oregon.

Different types of spray materials in common use are considered in the new program. The purpose of each spray, whether for insect or disease, the composition and strength for the different seasons, and the time of application under probable conditions, are given in the list of sprays. Suggestions for unusual or special conditions are brought out in the text. With this publication goes a bulletin on the preparation of spray materials by R. H. Robinson and published by the experiment station. The program is put out by the extension service. Both copies may be had on application to the College Exchange, Corvallis.

RECIPES AND COOKING

Cocoa Fluff—One cup sugar, four table-spoons of cocoa, one-half cup of water. Mix the ingredients in the exact order given. Boil the mixture rapidly for five minutes. Serve while hot.

Cocoa Sauce—One cup sugar, one-eighth teaspoon cream of tartar, 1 table-spoon of cocoa, one-fourth table-spoon vanilla, one-half cup water. Boil sugar, water, and cream of tartar until the consistency of thin syrup. Add cocoa and stir until it melts. Cool slightly and add vanilla.

Frozen Cocoa—Two cups of milk, five table-spoons cocoa, 1 1/2 cups sugar, one table-spoon of vanilla, one-eighth teaspoon of salt. Scald milk in double boiler and add cocoa, stirring until it is thoroughly dissolved. Add sugar, vanilla, and salt and chill and freeze. Serve with cream either plain or whipped.

Raisin Cocoa Cookies—One half cup fat, one cup sugar, one-fourth cup milk, four table-spoons cocoa, two table-spoons baking powder, flour to make a soft dough, one-half teaspoon cinnamon, one-half cup raisins, one-fourth teaspoon flavoring, two eggs. Cream fat and sugar. Add the cocoa which has been dissolved in the scalded milk. Add the eggs well beaten and the baking-powder, flour, cinnamon, raisins and flavoring. Roll very thin, cut and bake in hot oven.

Cocoa Corn-Starch Mold

Two table-spoons cocoa, four table-spoons sugar, one-eighth teaspoon salt, one cup boiling water, one and one-half cup milk, three eggs, one table-spoon granulated gelatin, one-fourth cup cold water, one-half teaspoon vanilla. Mix cocoa, sugar and salt. Add gradually, while stirring constantly, the boiling water. Let boil one minute, then add the milk, and as soon as scalded add slowly to the yolks of the eggs, slightly beaten. Cook in the double boiler until mixture thickens, stirring constantly. Swell gelatin in cold water; add hot mixture, and stir until dissolved. Strain, set in pan of ice-water, stir occasionally, and when quite thick fold in the whites of eggs which have been beaten stiff. Add the vanilla, mold, chill, and then serve.

Molasses Cookies—One and one half table-spoons butter or butter substitute, one-fourth of a cup of sugar, one and one-half table-spoons lard, one table-spoon milk, one half cup of molasses, two cups flour, four table-spoons cocoa, one-half teaspoon soda, one-half teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon cloves, one-half teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. Cream butter with sugar. Add melted lard and the milk, then the molasses. Add dry ingredients. Roll, cut, and bake in a moderate oven.

Cocoa Tapioca With Fruit—Two table-spoons pearl tapioca, two cups water, two-thirds cup sugar, one eighth teaspoon salt, two and one-half table-spoons of cocoa, two cups apple sauce. Soak tapioca overnight in one cup cold water. In the morning heat the other cup of water and add sugar, salt, and cocoa, and

stir until smooth. Add the tapioca mixture and cook over the direct heat about ten minutes. Put into a double boiler and cook until clear. Add apple sauce.—Chill and serve with cream.
