VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

HOUSEHOLD

Italian Polenta—Bring one qt. of water to the boiling point, add one and one-half teaspoons of salt and gradually stir in one cup of finely ground cornmeal. Let boil for fifteen minutes; then cook over hot water for 45 minutes; turn the mixture into a bread pan which has been well rubbed with butter and bake in a hot oven for ten minutes. Melt one-half cup of butter in a frying pan, add two shredded green peppers, 2 sliced onions and one-half cup of diced celery. Cook slowly until the vegetables are soft, add one pint of stewed tomatoes, salt and pepper to taste. Cook until thickened. Turn out the polenta in the center of a large platter, surround with the vegetable sauce, and sprinkle the top with grated cheese, and shredded peppers, or finely minced cooked meat.

Fried Sweet Peppers—Cut a piece of ham in small pieces, fry brown, then stir in chopped sweet peppers, one hot pepper if liked, salt, and a few drops of olive oil. Just before serving add two eggs and scramble all together. Garnish with lettuce and (if in season) a few slices of tomatoes.

Baked Potatoes—Bake the required number of potatoes unpeeled, then carefully remove the contents from a slit along one side of the potatoes. Mash, season, and beat until light, and return to the "shells" and serve at once.

Potato Puff and Cheese—Two cups of cold mashed potatoes, one egg, one-half cup of milk, one teaspoonful of melted butter, two tablespoonfuls of grated cheese, salt and pepper. Beat the potatoes and milk and butter together until light, then add the eggs. Pour into a greased pudding dish; cover the top lightly with grated cheese and bake until it is brown.

Baked Cabbage—Chop three pounds of cabbage, stir in one-half teaspoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of butter, one teaspoonful of dry mustard, a dash of red pepper and one-half cupful of water. Put in a buttered baking dish, lay on thin slices of bacon. Cover and bake one and one-half hours in a hot oven.

Sweet Potatoes Shoreham—1 baked sweet potatoes, two oranges, one-half cupful of maple syrup. Cut the potatoes in one fourth-inch slices lengthwise and arrange in a shallow baking dish. Lay three sections of orange, free from membrane, on

each slice of potato. Pour the maple syrup over the potatoes and bake in a moderate oven, frequently turning until the syrup is almost all absorbed by the potato. Serve in the same dish.

Vegetable Roast—One cupful vermicelli, one and one-half cups boiling water, three tablespoons shortening, three onions, quite small, one egg, one cupful bread crumbs, one cup chopped walnuts, one teaspoon of chopped parsley, one-half teaspoon poultry seasoning, one teaspoon salt. Cook vermicelli in boiling water until tender. Finely chop the onions and cook in the shortening until yellow, add egg well beaten, vermicelli, and remaining ingredients. Bake for one hour in a moderate oven, basting frequently with drippings. Serve with Brown Sauce.

Brown Sauce—2 tablespoons butter, three tablespoons rye flour, one sliced onion, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, one cup boiling water, one teaspoon of vegetable extract. Melt butter, add onion and cook until well browned, add rye flour mixed with salt and pepper, and stir until flour is browned. Then add boiling water in which the vegetable extract is dissolved. Stir until sauce boils, and then strain.

POTATO CERTIFICATION

GENERALLY PROFITABLE

Potato growers in the northwest are obtaining better yields by using certified seed. The merit of certification is slowly becoming understood by the general class of farmers. A large number of inquiries have been received this year from farmers, by the experiment station at Corvallis. While planting certified seed will not always result in a crop that will pass certification requirements, it usually means a better yield of potatoes. The potatoes will be more uniform and have less culls than where the common potatoes are used for seed.

Certified potatoes must be of uniform shape and size, showing the varietal characteristics, and comparatively free from disease. But do not think that because they are free from disease, you will get disease free potatoes that season. Potatoes may become infected from diseased soil or containers before planting. It serves as a disinfectant for the seed and kills the disease organisms that may have reached the surface of the seed from the containers. Use corrosive sublimate for treating them before the seed is cut for planting.
