## Household Dept.

### HOW TO SAVE FUEL

In planning a campaign of saving money in housekeeping, do not overlook the one place where waste so often occurs. That is in your cook stove.

No matter what the fuel—be it wood, coal, oil, gas, or electricity—there is a possibility of effecting a real saving by making out a table showing the time necessary for cooking certain foods.

Such tables come with many of the new stoves, but as fuel differ with localities it is wiser to make your own time table for cooking.

Supposing the fuel is gas. Time your oven and see how long it takes the oven to heat with one burner full blast, then how long it takes to heat when using two burners.

If you are baking biscuits, note how long it takes the oven to heat, how long to keep the oven at full heat, then how long to finish cooking when the heat is turned off.

Experiment with your oven until you learn how to bake biscuits to perfection. Then make a note of this. Next take the various kinds of cake, pie, meats, etc.

Now do the same with your boiling and frying and work out your tables so they may be referred to easily. This method will not only save your fuel but will improve your cooking and add interest to work that often becomes monotonous.

It will also aid you in planning menus because it will show the foods that require the same cooking temperature and the same length of time.

### SPENDING TO SAVE

Many of the economies practiced by careful housewives are really extravagances.

One of the best examples of this "Penny wise and pound foolish" policy is the unwillingness of the average housewife to take ice the year around.

It has been proven by careful investigation that ice more than pays for itself in the money it saves. But it is impossible to estimate the amount of money and time ice saves by protecting the health of the family.

Much of the winter sickness of babies and small children comes from feeding milk that is not being properly cared for. Milk—and all perishable food—should be kept at an even temperature and that temperature should be less than fifty degrees. Food does not have to smell of decay to become unfit for use, although all food that has a suspicious odor must be rejected. Serious cases of food poisoning have resulted

from eating foods that had no perceptible flavor or odor. Ice is the least of all household expenses. It reduces your food bill by preventing spoilage, it insures the freshness of your food. It keeps the milk sweet, the butter firm, the vegetables crisp and the meat fresh. Ice pays for itself in the food it saves. But the saving ice makes by guarding the health of your family is beyond measure.

### HOW TO COOK CEREALS

Cereals are a most necessary part of the diet—particularly of growing children, but often there is difficulty in getting a child to eat them.

Often this is due to the faulty manner of cooking and serving cereals. Half cooked, lumpy or scorched cereals are most unappetizing, while smooth, well-cooked cereals are delicious.

All cereals are better if they are allowed to soak over night in cold water then cooked in the water in which they were soaked. They will cook without lumping and will be much better flavored than cereals put to cook in boiling water.

Soaking cereals over night does not require any more time or work than cooking them in the ordinary way of putting them at once into boiling water. Measure the water, cereal and salt and put in the kettle in which they are to be cooked.

In the morning set the kettle over a slow fire and bring to the boiling point, stirring occasionally to prevent sticking. Boil two or three minutes, stirring constantly, then place over hot water to continue cooking.

Allow plenty of water for cereals and serve them as a gruel rather than as a mush. They cook more thoroughly in this manner and are much more palatable. Yellow corn meal makes a delicious cereal when soaked over night and then cooked in plenty of water.

### SEED SELECTING

Now that spring seed catalogs are being distributed, it is worth while to call the grower's attention to the desirability of using standard varieties of seed that agree with market demands, and which have proved their value over a period of years. It is important to standardize a product in any community that the same variety of vegetable should be produced by all growers. A list of recommended varieties of vegetables can be obtained from the college exchange, at Corvallis.

## "GALLONS," NOT POUNDS

Experienced fruit growers who read the methods of making spray for control of apple scab in last week's issue of the Review knew that "gallons" instead of "pounds" was meant in giving the amounts of lime-sulfur to each 100 gallons of water. Those who did not know are so informed in a correction sent out by the farm news writer of O. A. C. The formulas are 3 1/2 gallons—concentrated commercial lime-sulfur solution—to 100 gallons water for the delayed dormant spray; 2 1/2 gallons for the pink spray; 2 1/2 gallons for the calyx spray and 2 gallons for the 15-day spray. For the 30-day spray when necessary use some non-caustic sulfur spray or sulfur dust. Send for spray program sent free on request by the O. A. C. extension service.

It is reported that 5,250 people were killed by gas in 1924. Statistics divided the fatalities as follows: 50 inhaled it; 200 lit a match to find where it was leaking; and 5,000 stepped on it.
