WHY FARMING DECLINED

A review of the present status of agriculture in New England has shown that the more important contributing causes of the condition which exists are: Waste of farm resources; failure to understand and practice the fundamental principles of business; lack of an adequate program of farm management and soil management; with the attendant depletion of soil fertility; choice of an unsuitable and unmarketable variety; the use of poor seed; the keeping and breeding of inferior animals; the use of purchased feeds in stead of home grown grain; quantity instead of quality production; and failure to grade produce properly and according to law. RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

HOW TO USE DRY BREAD

Wasting bread is inexcusable because dry bread has so many uses. And dry bread also helps in the saving of other foods. Toast is one of the best ways to use a large amount of bread. To make toast an appetizing food trim it crusts off, cut in regular slices and toast until golden brown. Spread with soft butter and serve immediately.

Cinnamon toast is delicious.

Trim and toast bread and then spread with the following mixture: One quarter cupful butter creamed with one-half cup powdered sugar and one level teaspoonful ground cinnamon.

Set under gas flame or in hot oven for just a moment, then serve at once.

Cream toast is a dish that will tempt an invalid.

Heat the cream over hot water, then pour over hot buttered toast. Set in hot oven two or three minutes and serve.

French toast is made by dipping bread in egg and milk and frying until brown.

Use one egg for a half cupful milk and a little salt. Beat well, dip bread in mixture and stand until all the liquid is absorbed. Fry slowly in butter or bacon drippings until brown and serve with honey or jam.

Apple Betty is made with dry bread and sliced apples.

Butter a baking dish and fill with alternate layers of dry bread broken into small pieces and sliced apples, sprinkled with a little sugar and cinnamon or nutmeg.

If bread is very dry moisten with a little cider or the juice made from boiling the peels and cores of the apples.

Bake in a moderate oven until apples are tender.

Save every crust of bread and every broken piece and dry in a warm oven, being careful not to brown the pieces.

Put them through food chopper or roll with rolling pin until crumbs are of an even size. Store in glass-stopped fruit jars.

Use bread crumbs for meat and poultry dressings, for seasoned dishes, croquettes, puddings and for breading chops.

For serving with soup, cut the bread into half-inch cubes and brown lightly in the oven. These croutons can also be used as a breakfast dish in place of cereal, and served with cream or hot milk and sugar.

ECONOMIZE WITH GELATINE

The woman who really wishes to economize on food by not wasting it will find gelatine remarkable helpers.

And besides its ability to

convert leftovers into foods as good to eat as they are to look at—it also forms the basis of many delicious and nourishing salads and desserts.

The plain granulated gelatine is more adaptable than is the flavored and sweetened kind. And it is almost as easy to prepare.

Lemon jelly is delicious as a salad or dessert, and can be varied in countless ways by the addition of fruits, nuts, and marshmallows, etc.

Soak one level tablespoonful granulated gelatin in one-third cupful cold water ten minutes. Add one cupful boiling water and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Then add one-half cup sugar and stir until sugar is dissolved. Cool, add one-third cupful lemon juice, strain and set on ice to harden.

Lemon sponge is made by adding the stiffly beaten whites of two eggs to the lemon jelly just as it starts to stiffen.

Serve with a boiled custard that is made from the yolks of the eggs and flavored with a few drops of vanilla.

Any cooked fruit juice may be used for gelatine desserts.

Do not use more than two cupfuls of liquid for one tablespoonful of gelatine. Always soak the gelatin in the cold water before adding the boiling liquid. Add sugar to suit taste.

BUY GRIMM ALFALFA

Grimm alfalfa, the variety proving itself best adapted to Washington County conditions, has a branching root system as compared to the long straight tap root of the common variety of alfalfa. Grimm alfalfa is a comparatively new variety in the United States as it did not gain much nation-wide notice until more recent years.

Insist on Grimm alfalfa seed when purchasing for local planting. There is no way of telling the difference between Grimm and common alfalfa, so the purchaser must rely on the honesty of the seller, or purchase Grimm seed in sealed packages. Montana, Idaho and other states, art selling sealed seed. Sealed seed has a metal tag attached to the tied up sack in such a manner that the sack cannot be opened without breaking the metal seal or else breaking the tie. Unbroken packages bearing the association label of these states guarantee to the purchaser that the package contains genuine Grimm seed.

CULTIVATE ALFALFA WITH CARE

There is considerable confusion as regards the proper time for seeding alfalfa. Successful plantings have been made in this county from April 14th to June 6th.

Those planting late must have a solid seed bed with a shallow covering of loose soil and the seed should by all means be cut in with a drill. Care must be used too that the seed is not drilled in too deeply.

It is thought that the safer plan is for the majority to plant alfalfa seed about corn planting time. Many will fail with the late planting, especially during dry years.

Advocates of late planting argue that many of the weeds can be killed off before the crop is seeded and that the alfalfa has a chance to make a rapid growth. Those planting early have the advantages of more moisture for starting the crop but weeds are likewise more troublesome. The weeds, however, can be checked by cutting alfalfa, weeds and all with a mower. This will not injure the alfalfa and serves as a check to the weeds.

MANY FARMERS PLANTING ALFALFA

More than 200 farmers have pooled orders for Grimm alfalfa seed. Many of these orders are for trial packages. The encouraging feature of these orders are that farmers who put in trial plots last year and the year before are now buying seed for larger acreages. J. S. Van Kleeck is planting about five acres; S. M. Mears, Sherwood, Rt. 3, about eight; Frank Hargraves, Sherwood, about 5 acres; Otto Schaltenbrano or Sherwood, 3 acres; Chas. Herb, Banks, 4 acres, but the list is too long to give in full.
