LETTERS

From Our Readers

Editor, The Review: In last week's issue of the Review there was a statement in which it was said that Beaverton had the lowest taxes of any of the nine towns in the county. This is true in so far as the millage for city tax goes, but is misleading when the whole taxes are taken into consideration. Nothing was said about our 21.4 mills special school tax, or of our being fourth highest in the county. The average in the county for school is 5.13 plus, so we have nothing to brag on in this score.

I do not know about the tax of others in town, but believe my neighbors fare no better than I do, and this is the way mine are:

My 1923 tax was 1.36% of my 1922, or an increase of \$35.62.
My 1924 tax is 3.30% of my 1923, or an increase of \$313.62 over my 1923, and this is on identically the same property, not one dollar having been added in improvement, my new building not being yet assessed.

If all the property of the town is assessed 3.50% of 1923 taxes, as mine is, we ought to have enough money to pay off a big part of our bonded indebtedness.
