MUCH DAMAGE DONE BY FIRE
 Approximately \$10,000,000 of merchantable timber is destroyed by fire every year in the United States, according to government reports. In addition to this is the destruction of young growth, soil erosion and irregular stream flow, destruction of wild life and prevention of recreational use, all of which cannot be reckoned in dollars.

A SPONGE THAT STAYS WET
 A rubber sponge, kept wet by running water is a new time-saving invention for cleaning automobiles, says the Popular Science Monthly. A rubber tubing is fastened to the sponge through a hollow handle and the other end of the tubing is attached to a faucet or garden hose. A small stream of water is sufficient to keep the sponge moist.

FARM REMINDERS
 Oregon poultry houses can be kept free from insect pests by liberal applications of white-wash on the walls. Spraying is better than brushing it on, as the force of the sprayer gets the liquid in the cracks and crevices that are not usually reached by the brush.

Gooseberry growers intending to send berries to the canneries must not apply sulfur in any form to the developing berries. Sulfur causes a gas formation in the cans, so canneries will not accept fruit treated with sulfur.

Green feed may be given to chicks as soon as they will eat it. Swiss chard, lettuce, lawn clippings, or sprouted oats cut in one-quarter inch lengths are good Oregon green feeds.

DRY LIME-SULFUR DISSOLVED IN WATER is a convenient substitute for commercial liquid lime-sulfur. It is somewhat more expensive to apply than lime-sulfur solution of equivalent strength. However, it is commendable itself to those who cannot readily obtain the liquid lime-sulfur or who have to haul it a long distance. The excellent quality of some of the dry lime-sulfur on the market is leading to an increased use of this material among commercial growers.

BE READY TO PUT OUT FIRE
 Having a fire extinguisher on hand may mean the saving of valuables. You can make one yourself. All you have to do is to dissolve 20 pounds of common salt and 10 pounds of chloride of ammonia in 7 gallons of water. Pour this into thin glass quart bottles, cork well, and seal to prevent evaporation. When you discover a blaze throw a bottle into the flame with sufficient force to shatter it or break off the neck of the bottle and scatter the contents on the fire.

FARMERS AVAIL SELVES OF LOANS
 Oregon farmers to the number of 10,007 has availed themselves of loans totalling \$30,948,850, from Federal land banks, joint stock land banks and Federal intermediate credit banks since these agencies were first established by law, according to the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation. During this period the Federal land banks and joint stock land banks had applications for loans totalling \$37,096,589, and of this \$30,568,250 was granted, the loans being safeguarded by 1,831,138 acres of land in the state having an appraised valuation on land and buildings of \$81,331,092.

The entire range of farm life is covered in the purposes for which the loans were secured. Seventy four per cent of the loans were used for the payment of mortgages, five per cent for the purchase of land mortgaged, 10.5 for the payment of various debts, 3.5 for buildings and improvements, 1 per cent for implements and equipment, and 2.5 per cent for the purchase of livestock.

The extent to which the farm loan banks, the joint stock land banks and the more recently organized intermediate credit banks are being used by farmers in this and other states is an indication that these new
