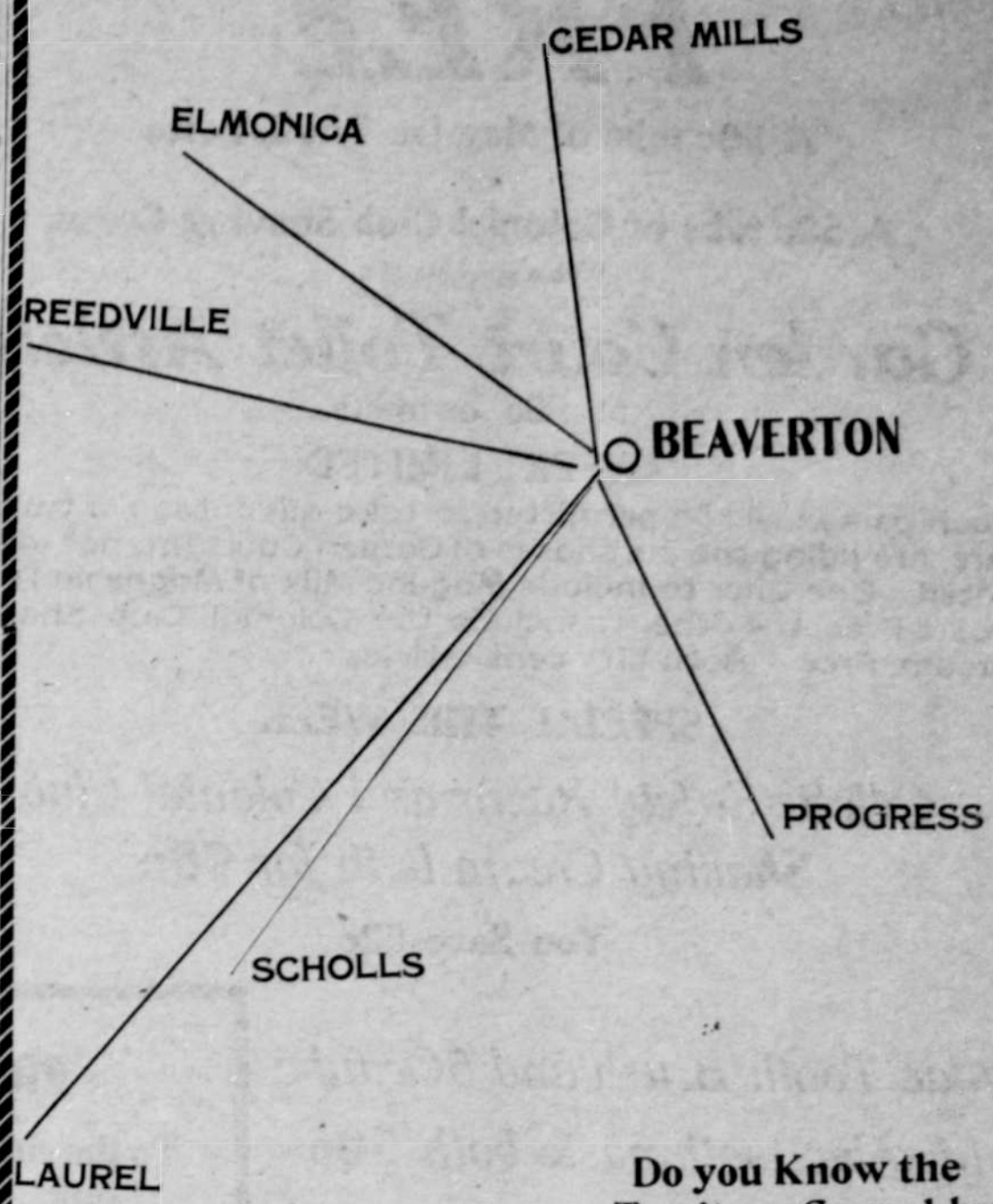
This market is for the members only, so if any of your neighbors do not belong encourage them to join at once.
