VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPIES AND SUGGESTIONS

Butter will not absorb foreign odors if it is kept in a tight, covered receptacle.

A sprinkling of borax should prove very successful in ridding a place of roaches.

If you warm a lemon before you squeeze it, you will get a great deal more juice from the lemon.

A cracked egg can be boiled by wrapping it in paper. The paper becomes damp, adhering to the egg and closing the crack.

To clean water bottles and decanters, put in a dessert spoonful of rough salt, moistened with vinegar, and then shake until stains are removed.

In polishing boots and shoes, they should be rubbed over with a slice of raw potato before the polish is applied. It will clean and remove the stains.

An earthenware jardiniere is a very practical waste basket for a porch. It is not harmed by storms, does not blow over, and it is easily cleaned.

A good way to scale a fish is by rubbing it over a grater. This method is easier than that of scraping with a knife to remove the scales.

Wall papers should be light or dark enough to make a good background for the furniture. The design should never be so prominent that it competes with the furniture.
