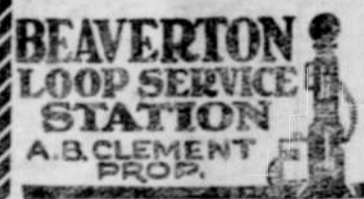

FARM REMINDERS

The common barberry on which the grain smut is dependent during the winter months in Oregon, is best destroyed in the spring and summer when the leaves are easily recognized. The bushes are dug completely out of the ground, with care that no pieces of roots are overlooked. If pieces are left in the ground young sprouts may grow from them.

Watch the poultry litter at this time of the year, and change it often. In some localities it is best to change it every ten days. Damp litter causes the house to be damp, and is the source of much disease.

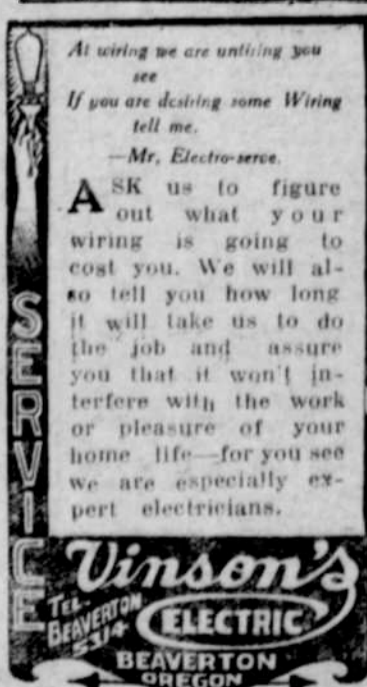

Irwin-Hodson Shop Gutted; Loss \$250,000
