USEABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Potatoes put through a food chopper dry much faster.

The bread board is saved by using small boards to chop vegetables on.

Don't put tin dishes away until you are sure they are perfectly dry.

Don't touch fish with steel knives or forks. They impart an unpleasant flavor.

Dry shredded coconut can be given the flavor of the fresh product by steaming one-half hour in a colander.

Don't lay greasy spoons or utensils on the table or stove; keep a tin tray for holding all such utensils; this will save cleaning.

In picking fowls, putting them quickly in hot water and then wrapping for a few minutes in a heavy paper makes the process easier.

Don't salt meat before cooking it unless you want to draw out all the juices and flavor. Add seasoning when the meat is well seared over.

A fork used in mixing pastry is a help. A large bottle filled with ice water, and a paper on which to roll the pastry are also useful pastry equipment.

Many sorts of cream whippers are in the market, but a light wire spoon, with the wires forming a large-size mesh across the spoon is satisfactory.

Don't let food of any kind dry on the baking dishes. Turn a little water into the dish; if an egg dish, use cold water; other foods will soak best in hot water.

Don't pour boiling water on soiled dishcloths; the grease, if there is any, will set in them. Soak in cold water and plenty of soap, then wash in hot water and boil.

Don't forget to dash on cold water when a little hot grease is spilled on the floor or table. It prevents the fat from sinking into the grain of the wood, and can be easily removed at once.

A pound of butter that has been creamed will spread about three loaves of sandwich bread, each loaf making 24 sandwiches cut thin or 18 cut thicker. It is a good idea to keep these proportions in mind especially in making sandwiches in quantity.

A heavy canvas bag and a milliet are useful in preparing bread crumbs. Cutting up chicken, shredding lettuce, and chopping raisins and marshmallows, are a few of the very many uses of good kitchen scissors. Rub the blades and the fingers with a little butter when preparing sticky food.

Here are a few tasty sandwich fillings: 1. American cheese and pimentos put thru the food grinder—an inexpensive filling for a large number of sandwiches; 2. Cream cheese, chopped nuts, and a few olives; 3. Cream cheese, chopped green and red peppers, mayonnaise dressing; 4. Ham finely minced, chopped celery, mayonnaise, and mustard; 5. Salmon, tuna fish, lobster, crab meat or shrimp finely minced, chopped celery, salt, paprika, and mayonnaise; 6. Raisins, prunes, or dates and nuts that are chopped and added to sweet salad dressing.

NOTICE OF THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A WEED CONTROL DISTRICT FOR CANADIAN THUSTLE.

Notice is hereby given by the County Court of the State of Oregon, and for Washington County, that the whole of Washington County with its present boundaries has been declared by said County Court to be a weed control district for the purpose of destroying and preventing the seeding and spreading of Canada Thistle, declared by this Court to be a noxious weed, under the provisions of Chapter 265, pages 380-383 of the 1923 Laws of the State of Oregon, and that such resolution and law will go into effect in said Washington County immediately after the second publication of this notice, to wit: on July 9th, 1925.

All property owners are hereby notified that they must immediately destroy and prevent the seeding and spreading of said Canadian Thistle, a noxious weed, not only on their own lands but upon their half of the highway adjoining their land; that any failure so to do is a misdemeanor under said law and that upon their failure to comply with said Act the Weed Inspector of Washington County will immediately take steps to destroy said weeds as in said Act provided and file the cost thereof as a tax lien against said property as provided by law.
