ALFALFA FOR EVERY COW

Can Washington County raise County farmers makes it appear that the question can be answered in the affirmative.

The results of the past three years planting by Washington County farmers makes it appear that the question can be answered in the affirmative. Some say that one half acre of alfalfa per head of dairy stock will fill this need. This would mean about 10,000 acres of alfalfa in Washington County. The yields are from three and one-half to six tons per acre annually. If the average yield is placed at four tons the ten thousand acres would yield annually about 10,000 tons of hay worth from \$320,000.00 to \$600,000.00, depending upon the markets.

It is easy to figure, you say. Granted, but we may yet see the day in Washington County when the alfalfa acreage will be about 5,000 acres. With a home supply of dairyland's best and most profitable feed, the dairymen will be in a better position to weather such financial difficulties as have beset them the past few months, and best of all, alfalfa offers a steady and reliable year after year supply of summer green feed and abundant roughage for winter feeding.

Watch the established plantings of alfalfa, and also the new. If the other fellow can grow alfalfa why not you under the same or similar soil conditions.

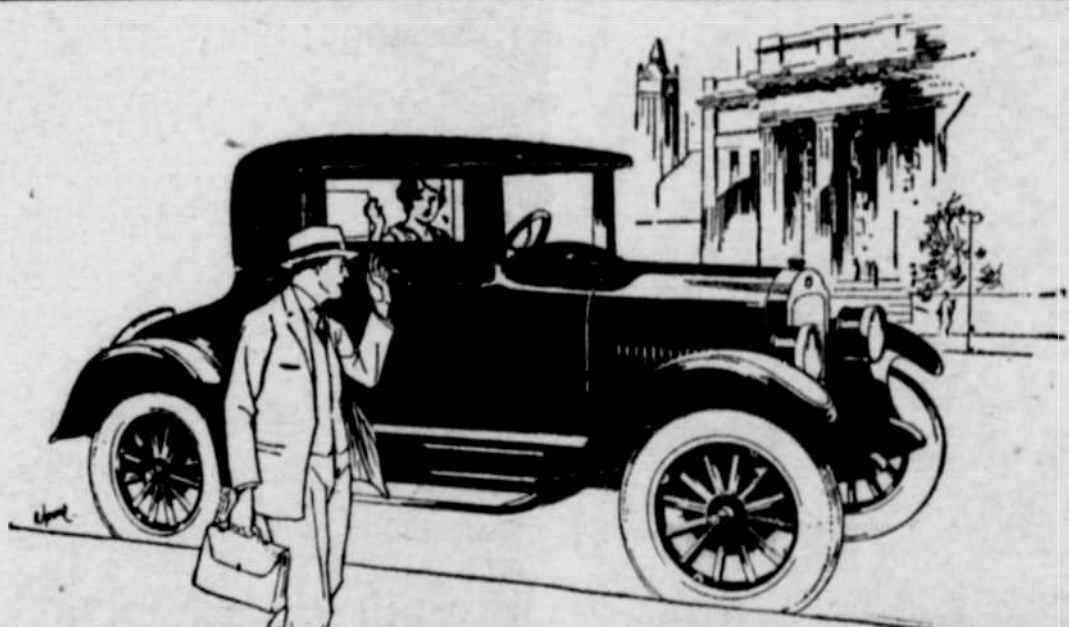
