 VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Apple peelings and a little rhubarb boiled up in aluminum ware will brighten it up like new.

For a Change, grate a little dry cheese and add it to the sauce to be poured over potatoes for escalloping.

An ounce of warm soap suds used daily about the cracks on pantry shelves is worth a pound of cure after ants or other crawling vermin come.

A good silver polish is sour milk. Immerse the silver in it a few minutes and the mild acid will brighten it without injury.

The carpet sweeper should be thoroughly cleaned once a week and the brush freed from all hairs and threads. Where oil is used apply sparingly to the bearings; a feather is very good for applying.

For a change of flavor in cake, sometimes use cold coffee instead of milk in making the "standby."

To toughen shoe soles, take a pair of new shoes and warm the soles well. While still warm, paint the bottoms of the soles with copal varnish, applying with brush. When dry, warm again and paint on another coat. Three coats are sufficient and the soles will not only be waterproof, but will last 3 times as long as usual. Children will not be troubled with cold or wet feet if their shoes are treated in this way before they wear them.

One of the best things that can be made is one of rich cream and powdered sugar. Put cream in a bowl. Put in the sugar and mix until of the right consistency. Beat for a few minutes. Flavor and spread on cake. This is easy to make and is delicious.

When your cups are cracked or lose their handles, do not throw them away. They make excellent gelatin and custard molds. They are also good to use for storing jelly when glasses are scarce.

ESTABLISHING CONSUMERS' STORES

Cooperative organizations are working along the lines of farmer-consumer co-operation, with the plan of operating consumers' stores in the big cities; operating their own middle-handling agencies and dividing the middle profits between the raiser and consumer. These organizations say they have no fight against the retailer, but unless the retailers will co-operate and buy direct from the consumers' organizations they will be obliged to operate their own stores in competition. The purpose of the farmer-consumers' is to raise the price paid to growers and to lower the prices to consumers. This they say can be accomplished by eliminating the several middle profits and expenses. They claim that lower prices to the homes will increase consumption and better conditions generally.

FARM REMINDERS

Oregon potato growers working for seed certification find it best to join the inspector in making field examinations. The weeds, diseased, and off-type tubers are pointed out by the O. A. C. extension specialists to be dug and removed from the field. Disease may be otherwise spread rapidly from plant to plant until much of the field is disqualified. Failure to do the roguing at these times will cause rejection of the field.

Cooking grains for pig feed has been shown by feeding tests to be not only of no value, but detrimental. While it may have a slight beneficial effect on the starches, cooking seems to lessen the digestibility of protein and mineral matter. Potatoes, being very starchy, must be cooked for best results. Roots are not often improved by cooking, and steaming alfalfa has not proved profitable so far.

Remodeling an Oregon tunnel pruner drier to double its capacity costs less than building additional units sufficient to double the capacity. Blue prints of the new system, as worked out by E. H. Wiegand of the O. A. C. experiment station, will be sent free of charge to Oregon at \$1.50 each. The system provides for drawing the warmed air back again to be used over and over again in heating and hydrating the fruit, instead of throwing it out through the stack and wasting it.

The lines in drainage of Oregon white lands are laid four rods apart in the O. A. C. experiment station plan of under drainage. The tiles have been found to draw for two rods on each side.
