VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPIES AND SUGGESTIONS

Tomato Stuffing for Peppers—Mix one cupful of tomato pulp with half a cupful of fine breadcrumbs. Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter in a saucepan, stir in two tablespoonfuls of flour, and add half a cupful of stock or water. Cook for five minutes, and add the tomato pulp and breadcrumbs. Season with salt, paprika, nutmeg, and onion juice, and allow to boil; then fill the peppers.

Cold Cucumber Pickles—Fill glass jars with small cucumbers, cover with the following mixture, and seal: 1 gallon of vinegar, two and one-half cups sugar, one cup of salt, and one half cup of dry mustard. Mix the sugar, salt, and mustard together dry, then add the vinegar. This is enough for eight quarts.

Chocolate Nut Cookies—Mix together one cup of brown sugar, one-half cup of butter, one-half cup of sour milk, two squares of melted chocolate, one and one-half cups of flour, one-half teaspoon of soda dissolved in sour milk, one teaspoon of vanilla, and one cup of chopped walnut meats. Stir together and drop by spoonfuls on greased tins. Bake, and when cold, cover with chocolate icing and sprinkle the tops with chopped walnuts.

Cream Puffs—One-half cup shortening, one cup of boiling water, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, 1 cup flour, one-eighth teaspoon salt, three eggs. Heat water and shortening in a saucepan until it boils up well; add flour, sifted with salt, all at once and stir vigorously. Remove from fire as soon as it is mixed. Cool and mix in unbeaten eggs, one at a time. Add baking powder, mix well, and drop by spoonfuls one and one-half inches apart on greased tin. Shape into circular form with wet spoon. Bake twenty-five minutes in hot oven. With a sharp knife, cut a slit near the bottom of the puff to admit filling. Fill with sweetened whipped cream.

Cornflake Macaroons—Take 1 cupful each of cornflakes, coconut, and sugar, two well-beaten eggs, two tablespoonfuls of flour, salt to taste, one teaspoonful of vanilla. Drop by spoonfuls on a baking sheet. This makes twenty-five cakes.

Jumbles—Take one cupful of molasses, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of soda; beat well, add three well-beaten eggs, 1 cupful of brown sugar, 1 cupful of shortening, salt to taste, one-half tablespoonful of ginger, one-half teaspoonful of cinnamon, and four cupfuls of flour measured scantily. Drop like drop cookies.

FARM REMINDERS

Common vetch and gray winter oats have been used in the O. A. C. station trials for dairy silage, as recommended for Oregon in general. Purple vetch for the coast district shows a little more promise. The new product, Hungarian vetch, is recommended for the very heavy lands of the valley district. Winter barley can be used with the vetch for silage and gives good results.

Increasing demand for canned goods and other horticultural products give ground for belief that the Oregon fruit industry will continue to hold its own and undergo a slight expansion. Future plantings should be limited by present and prospective market conditions, as potential production far in excess of present market requirements. Western growers will profit by recognizing that producers are largely the servants of consumers and must produce only to the extent that consumers can be induced to buy. Vigorous demand for any one fruit does not mean that the demand is unlimited and justifies unlimited plantings.

Core break-down of Oregon pears can be controlled by picking at the proper time. This can be done without sacrifice of either tonnage or quality of the pears, according to the O. A. C. experiment station.
