Household Dept.

VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS
 In order to have a custard pie an even, nice brown, just sprinkle a little sugar over the top before putting in the oven.

Put oregano, mint, parsley, lettuce, or any of the green herbs, after washing well, in a glass fruit-can, seal and put in a cool place. They will keep fresh and crisp for a week.

When roasting pork slit it at intervals and insert pieces of tart apple. This not only improves the flavor of the meat, but gives a delicious taste to the gravy.

Candy animals may be made from the celluloid forms to be bought at the ten-cent store. Separate the animal with a sharp knife along the seam, fill with any candy-mixture after giving the mold a greasing of butter, and in a few minutes it will be ready to unmold. These candies will delight the small children, at Christmas or any other time.

A discarded safety-razor blade is not only a fine thing to rip with, but also serves to scrape paint from the windows.

Tie your old fruitjar rubbers together in the form of a mat and place in the sink to save scratching off the enamel when using the dishpan in the sink.

The next time you have to blacken the stove, try first lathering the hands plentifully with good soap, letting it dry on; then after your work is done the blacking comes off with the soap.

Put a thimble over the end of the curtain-rod. This enables it to slip easily through the casing.

Flour-, salt-, and sugar-bags can be utilized in many ways after they have served their original purpose. They seem determined, however, not to lose their identity, so persistently do they hold onto their lettering. Soap and water, the universal enemy of dirt, has no effect on them, but if the letters are saturated well with kerosene the night before they are to be washed, they lose their stick-to-it-iveness. Then a brisk boiling in hot soap-suds the next morning will remove every trace of the lettering.

Have a large salt-shaker containing both salt and pepper in the usual proportions—about one-fourth as much pepper as salt—to use in dishes requiring both seasonings. Also keep another salt-shaker with a coarse top filled with sugar to sift over the tops of cookies.

A good way to sugar doughnuts and crullers is to put them in a paper bag with the sugar and shake well. This covers them evenly and is a saving of sugar.

Here is a makeshift for anybody who has no tub-pan for baking cake, and happens to need one. Take a small baking-powder can, fill it with clean pebbles, place it in the exact center of the cake-tin you wish to use and distribute the batter around it. When the cake is done, it is a very easy matter to lift out the can—and there you are.

FARM REMINDERS

Two lime-loving crops in Oregon should never be sown in succession even after liming unless the lime applied has been excessive. Different soils may react differently to different amounts of lime applied. A thorough acidity test will very often save considerable on lime applications.

"I don't believe the results from the use of lime on grain are very marked the first year," says J. J. Doerfler of the Inyan Karia farm near Silverton, "but our records show that it does increase yields even on grains the second and the following years."

Growers in the Willamette valley should apply the third codling-moth cover spray not later than August 10. The first moths of the second generation appeared in the rearing cage July 25. It is estimated that the maximum number of moths appeared during the first week in August. The egg hatching period began on about August 3, and the peak of the egg hatching period will probably be about the middle of August. The poison cover spray should be on the foliage, pears and apples before the worms hatch. Increasing the dosage to five pounds of powdered arsenate of lead to 200 gallons of water in this spray is a frequent practice.

In going through the potato fields often outstandingly vigorous plants may be seen—large growers, that are healthy and not next to any diseased plants. Such healthy plants should be marked with a stake for separate digging. If these are good producers, they should be saved for next year's seed plot.

It is economically unwise to put fertilizer on Oregon soils deficient in lime, says the O. A. C. experiment station. The "sluggish" soils do not make the best use of fertilizer, while lime adds "fith" to the soil.
