OREGON ATTRACTS EASTERN CAPITAL

Oregon's vast undeveloped resources and the dawning of a new era of industrial activity in the Pacific Northwest has attracted additional Eastern capital.

Announcement has been made by the Commercial Investment Trust Company of New York that they will open headquarters in Portland for the purpose of financing manufacturers, dealers, and industries doing business on time paper.

This company is one of the largest finance companies in the United States. The Board of Directors is composed of men of large financial and business interests, among them David May, of the May department stores, Morton J. May, and Edward G. Wilmer of Dodge Brothers, and others of equal prominence.

W. G. Ide, who has been manager of the Land Settlement Department of the State-Wide Development Fund for the past two years, and General Secretary of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce over a period of several months has been chosen as manager of the new financing company.

Arthur Foster, who has been assistant in land settlement work, and actively in charge of the Ashland Gateway office for the past six months, will succeed Mr. Ide as manager of the Land Settlement Department in the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

THINGS REQUIRED IN LIGHT BULBS

The Oregon Public Utility Information Bureau has been asked to give a list of the materials that are used in the ordinary modern electric light bulb and where the raw materials are secured.

In order to complete the production of one of these little indispensable devices, it is necessary for the manufacturers to call on the raw material resources of a dozen or more countries.

Here, for instance, are some of the things that go into the little bulb:

- Potash from Germany.
- Feldspar from Sweden.
- Manganese from the Caucasus.
- Cork and pyrites from Spain.
- Shellac from India.
- Tin from the Malay States.
- Tungsten from Japan.
- Sodium carbonate from British East Africa.
- Bismuth from Australia.
- Cryolite from Greenland.
- Cobalt and nickel from Ontario.
- Molybdenum from Quebec.
- Nitre from Chile.
