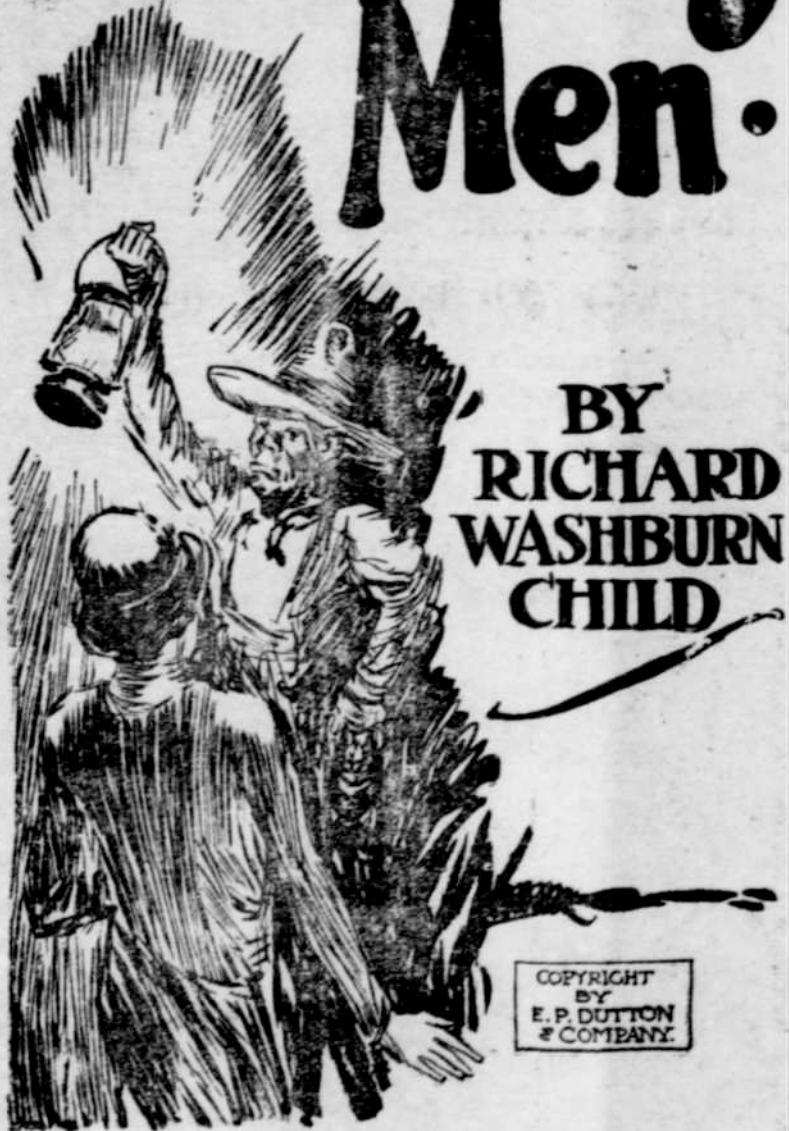

FARM REMINDERS

The sooner owners of apple and pear trees damaged by cankers apply a spray of bordeaux the better. This is the best method known of preventing infections of apple tree anthracnose, and European canker on apple and pear trees, and peach blight as well.

Three conditions are necessary for successful wintering of bees in any locality. The first is that there be a liberal supply of young workers produced during late August and September; second, that there be ample stores of honey in the hives during the winter months, and early spring; and third, that ample protection for the colony is given against the winter cold and moisture.

Protection against winter infection of Oregon loganberry canes with leaf anthracnose, bud blight, and cane die back may be afforded to a considerable extent by spraying the canes at this time of year with bordeaux mixture. The canes should be covered from base to tip.

Farmers having seed wheat to treat for smut but not a sufficient quantity to warrant purchase of a commercial duster for applying copper carbonate may obtain directions for making at home the O. A. G. diagonal axle dusting machine for treating wheat if they will ask their county agent or will write to the college for extension bulletin No. 381. This machine will treat 20 to 30 bushels an hour satisfactorily.

If properly mixed, homemade bordeaux spray is superior to the commercially prepared product, says H. P. Bars, plant pathologist at the Oregon experiment station. The ready-mixed material is inferior for a winter spray especially as it does not adhere so readily as that prepared on the farm. Where the constituents are sold in separate packages by commercial concerns a good product may be prepared conveniently from them. Full directions for mixing bordeaux may be obtained free by writing to the experiment station at Corvallis.

GRAIN, HAY, AND POTATOES

Grain, hay, and potato yields in the state are considerably larger than last year in Oregon. In the U. S. the potato yield is estimated to be 100,000,000 bushels less than last year, and the outlook is good for fair prices.

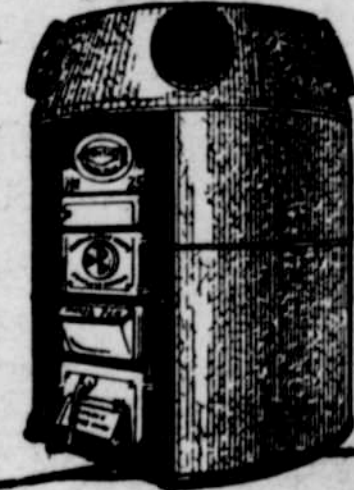
