As to costs and taxes: Nobody can yet tell the exact cost but competent engineers estimate it at \$3,000,000, and at this cost on present assessed valuation it would be taxed at 75 cents per \$1000 of valuation, but if it enhances the valuation as it has in San Francisco and other similarly located cities the millage will be materially reduced. How many would not gladly pay this additional tax to be able to go thru the tunnel in cold weather when the hills are covered with ice and know you can go in safety?

We are all selfish beings—looking to our own interests, and it is fight we should. I believe the tunnel will be of material benefit to every legal voter in this tunnel district.
