Shearer Shot Hunting Pheasants

Popular Young Mason Is Instantly Killed While Getting Out Of Automobile Near Bethany

This community was badly shocked Thursday by the news of the death of Delbert Shearer. He was well-known in this community and probably no young fellow here was better liked and respected. It was the first day of pheasant hunting season and he and his friend, Harold Nixon, had planned to leave early in the morning, but on account of the fog didn't get away until about 9 o'clock. They were in the vicinity of Bethany when they saw a flock of pheasants over in a potato field, and Shearer took out his gun and shot at them under protest of his friend Nixon, who told him that they shouldn't shoot from the car.

They had been out of the car previously and both guns were between the men in the front seat when Shearer reached for his. They attempted to get out of the car while it was still in motion, Nixon toward the right hand side and Shearer in the opposite direction, when in some unaccountable manner Nixon's gun was discharged. The gun was blown right out of Nixon's hands and struck in the road beside the car. The charge entered Shearer's head just back of the right ear, going upward and across the head. He settled back into the seat, having been killed instantly.

Nixon called to a farmer who was close by to go to Bethany, telephone the Sheriff, and bring help. Soon the Sheriff and Coroner arrived. The remains were taken to Hillsboro first but when his father was notified, he ordered them brought to Beaverton to Pegg's undertaking rooms. Mr. Pegg, accompanied by the family and friends, will take the remains to Goldendale, Washington, where he will be buried Saturday, services being held only in the cemetery.

NEW SETTLERS COMING TO OREGON

A harvest moon has been shining over the Land Settlement Department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce for the past week and the sheaves garnered have been new settlers for Oregon.

That the entire state has been benefited by the land settlement work of the past year, and that the past summer season particularly has been very fruitful one, is proven by the reports that daily come into this department.

So far for the week 146 new settlers have been reported. The counties at work checking up their new families, and are mailing in their lists as their indorsement of the State Wide Development campaign now in progress.

The following new settlers have been reported: 6 for Clackamas County; 61 for Marion County during August and September; 28 for Lane county; 47 for Benton county; and 10 for Josephine county.

In addition to the new settlers just reported, by the different counties, twelve families have located during the past month through the Land Settlement Department.

The pear crop at Medford is estimated at 1600 carloads.

Wheat exports at Portland for September were 2,984,595 bu.

The Hood River apple crop is now estimated at 2600 carloads.

Grants Pass was host to Oregon Irrigation Congress, Oct. 6 to 7.

Building permits for nine months at Eugene totaled \$2,148,845.

Paying work has begun on Oregon City-Canomal section at Ganby.

93,522 cases of salmon were shipped from Astoria during September.

The Roseburg women's club plans to build a clubhouse and auditorium.

Union county farmers are cutting the third crop of alfalfa for this year.

Oregon eggs are being shipped in cold storage to exclusive English market.

The Hursh display Co. opened a factory at Portland with \$20,000 capital.

The Salem high school shows a 14 per cent gain in enrollment over 1924.

Groves cannery of Woodburn will operate until Christmas with 110 employees.

The Willamette river is now open for navigation between Salem and Portland.

Electricity is now available at Sandy at low rates from the Bull Run power plant.

Negotiations are under way for a big linen mill at Eugene to employ 300 people.

500 state prisoners at Salem are at work, most of them in the prison flax plant.

Nine months building permits at Portland were \$32,170,510, 37 per cent above 1924.

The Pacific Steamship Co. of Portland reports a 15 per cent passenger gain over 1924.

The Towle Co. of Klamath Falls has built a manufacturing plant at its Sprague river mills.

The Astoria section of the Columbia River Highway will be repaved, at a cost of \$261,402.

The Northwestern Electric Co. of Portland spent \$20,000, repairing the white salmon power line.

A vein of potter's clay, 1200 feet wide, was found on the North Umpqua river near Roseburg.

The Webster Spar Co. of Portland, with mills at Columbia city, adds \$450,000 to working capital.

Nestle's milk condensary at McMinnville reopened with 50 employees, to handle 90,000 lbs of milk daily.

The state highway commission approves the proposed Long-Bell toll bridge across the Columbia at Rainier.

The West Coast power Co. is rebuilding the power and light system at Newport. New service is extended to Yaquina.

Umpqua Mills and Timber Co. buys 350,000,000 feet of timber on Smith river, and will increase the capacity of their mills at Reedsport.

Oregon Pulp & Paper Co. at Salem has developed a successful process for utilizing Douglas fir and other resinous soft woods for high grade paper.

The Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers is said to be the largest wool association in the United States and the largest marketing organization in Oregon.
