PETITION FOR PORTLAND TELEPHONE CIRCULATED
Parties were circulating a petition last week to be presented to the Public Service Commission of Oregon asking for a hearing be granted on the question of allowing Portland phone calls to come into Beaverton.

The matter of direct connection by telephone with Portland has been under consideration for some time by a good many people here and there are several who have expressed themselves that they would like a phone, but their business was largely with Portland.

The matter of cost of the telephone, however, probably was not very seriously considered by the signers of the petition. While there are some who can afford to pay the rates which would be asked by Portland there are a good many others who can not afford to pay those rates, for if we have direct connection with the Portland Exchange, the cost of which is included in the phone rental, we will pay for the use of the Portland Exchange, whether we use it or not.

The minimum charge on a business telephone in Portland is \$9.50 per month. We will venture to say that not many of the subscribers to the Beaverton Exchange are paying \$9.50 per month, even though they do use the Portland telephone all that they would use it if they had free exchange.

We believe that the minimum rate for the Beaverton telephone is \$1.50 per month. The minimum rate for the Portland residential telephone is \$3.50. It will be well to turn these matters over should the Public Service Commission grant a hearing to the petitioners in regard to the matter of direct connection. It might be better to ask the Portland Exchange or the Public Service Commission for a lower toll rate to Portland.
