FARM REMINDERS

Losses in germination and stand of wheat caused by dipping the seed in formaldehyde or bluestone solution to kill smut have been done away with on hundreds of thousands of acres of Oregon wheat land by the use of the copper carbonate dust treatment. The copper carbonate is applied by special treating machines.

Prunes were threatened this year with serious brown rot damage, the O. A. C. experiment station reports. An unusual outbreak of blossom blight and early brown rot attack on the green fruit occurred in many sections of western Oregon in the wet spring. This gave the disease a running start in prune and cherry orchards, and only the hot, dry summer and relatively dry conditions thru harvest saved growers from enormous losses. Infected orchards need cleaning up this fall.

Lambs from good, black-faced rams, and out of large, heavy milking ewes and run on good irrigated pastures, should weigh 80 pounds and be in good condition at an age of 5 to 6 months. If from ewes of poorer breeding, or bred along wool-producing lines, the lambs will be smaller and not fat.

The ewe to buy is the strong healthy ewe with a straight, broad back, and sound udder, sound teeth, and a heavy fleec of reasonable fineness. If she has these qualities the breed will not matter. Such a ewe when bred to a good Shropshire or Hampshire ram may be depended on to produce a good lamb. Ewes four to six years old produce the best lambs and are easier to handle, but are not worth as much money as yearlings because they are too near the end of their usefulness.

There are several ways of figuring lambing percentages, but the most common is to figure the number of lambs at marking time as compared with the number of ewes producing lambs. This lambing percentage does not take into consideration the ewes that die before lambing or the lambs that die between marking time and marketing time. If each 100 ewes bring 100 saleable lambs to the next summer, the lambing percentage will have to be about 110 per cent.

The big possibility for extra profit in sheep raising is by breeding up a flock of ewes that will produce more and better lambs than the average. Lowering the death losses by exceptional care, production of larger and more saleable lambs by good feed and a higher lambing percentage by extra care of breeding and lambing time, are all possibilities of extra profit.

Seventy-three cars of cattle left Baker City in one day recently.

Linn County potato growers received about \$300 an acre for this year's crop.

Forest fire losses in the Cascade National Forest were only \$879 during 1925.

The Southern Pacific Company is grading their new terminal grounds at Eugene.

The Northwestern Electric Co. will build a new \$125,000 warehouse at Albina station, Portland.

The Libby, McNeil & Libby cannery at The Dalles now employs 200 persons, canning apples.

Vernonia business men are planning to organize and finance a creamery in their community.

The contract has been let for a new grade school building at Ashland, to be erected at a cost of \$70,000.

Plans have been approved for a new \$1,000,000 paper mill at St. Helens. Construction will begin soon.

A new theatre will be built in Springfield, with a seating capacity of about one thousand people.

The Sugar-Loaf Creamery at Myrtle Point recently shipped three hundred cases of cheese in two days.

Josephine County farmers have shipped three thousand holiday turkeys, worth fifteen thousand dollars.

The Eugene Fruit Growers' Association shipped fifty cars of canned produce during the month of October.

The Flora Logging Company recently landed seventy carloads of logs, 611,000 feet, in one day, a world record.

The Producers' Canning and Packing Company has paid a net of \$85 a ton for Bartlett near pool in Salem. The ordinary prices ranged from \$55 to \$60 a ton.

Five Union County school districts are joining together to form one large union high school district with the building to be located in the town of Hermiston.

Prize celery from Labish bottoms, near Salem, was sent to President Coolidge for his Thanksgiving dinner. This district has shipped two hundred carloads of celery during the past few months.

Wrap Securely and Address Plainly in INK

We have been notified not to accept any parcels for mailing unless addressed plainly in ink and securely packed and tied with a stout string and bearing your return address in the upper left hand corner. Many parcels go astray each year by being poorly wrapped and addressed. Mail early and avoid the big Christmas rush. Parcels may be marked "Not to be opened until Christmas." Please buy your stamps before hand and have all letters and cards stamped before leaving them in the box. Last year I stamped as high as 175 letters and cards in one day. That takes up lots of valuable time during the busy period.

Follow the above instructions and we will both get better service. Remember—Mail early; wrap securely; and address plainly.
