Evans Brown, Accomplished Musician and Magician, to Appear Here Tuesday Eve

The third number of the Ellison-White Lyceum course will be given at the Beaver Theatre on Tuesday evening, January 5. Evans Brown, the musician, magician, and entertainer will appear.

So-called "occult" mysteries have long baffled visitors from east India and China and many believe that there is some spiritual communication that is not of this earth, in the weird manipulations of the voodoo priests of these countries.

Evans Brown has for years made a special study of the work of those who claim supernatural powers and the extent of his study has not revealed that there is anything aside from very clever and baffling magic. He has even gone so far as to borrow some of their tricks and these will be used on his appearance here at the Beaver Theatre Tuesday, January 5.

"The Haunted Cabinet and the Disc of Quong III" is an ancient mystery act which has baffled the Chinese thrill-hunters for a century or so. "The Chest of Confucius" is another thriller, wherein an "empty" chest, after examination by a committee from the audience, produces about everything Mr. Brown calls for, including some eight lanterns, a couple of "dragons" and what-not. "The Vagrant Flames," accompanied by the story of an old Hindu priest, is another of the bewildering mysteries to be shown.

Brown is much more than a magician. He is an exceptionally gifted harpist and carries one of the finest instruments made for his harp groups. He is a pianist of unusual achievement also.

His program is one that will long be remembered because of the wide variety in his entertainment. His musical numbers include both classical and popular numbers and he also renders one of his own compositions on the accordion. This gifted young artist makes a tremendous hit wherever he appears.

There were several wrestlers, including the "Russian Lion" and "Farmer" Vance, who witnessed the match. Also "Moose" Morbeck, who challenged the winner and scheduled to meet Kruse on Tuesday evening, Jan. 5th, at St. Anthony's Hall, Tigard.

This will be a fast bout. Morbeck has wrestled Kruse several times for thirty minutes, neither man having been able to win a fall from the other. The coming bout will be for 2 out of 3 falls, or a decision at the end of two hours. This will allow the wrestlers time enough to do their stuff, which Kruse says he can do in that length of time.

There has also been a thirty minute preliminary arranged between Bud Thompson, 147 pounds, and Jack Reynolds, 145 pounds.

1925 Prosperous For Business Men

The Past Year Has Shown Steady Increase of Volume of Business Done in Beaverton

The year 1925 has been a successful and prosperous year for business men of Beaverton. With two exceptions the business places who were here in 1921 report an increase of business for 1925. One concern claims that week by week his business has shown an increase of from five to 20 per cent, that in no week has it fallen lower than in the corresponding week of 1921.

One business man stated that he found money conditions close and that he had been obliged to turn away a considerable amount of business because of the tightness in the money market but this condition does not prevail generally.

Only one line of business represented in Beaverton reports a decrease over last year and of that they were not sure because all totals had not been added up. However, they felt that in a general way the business would be less than last year's, although they admit that the first part of 1925 was much better than the first part of 1924.

A good many business places have been put in the past year. These seem without exception to be in a flourishing condition.

Other places of business have changed hands and of course the new owners are not conversant with the business done during 1924.

It is believed that the total will much exceed that of last year when final accounting has been made after the first of the year.

PROMPT ACTION SAVES BURNING BUILDING

Prompt action in the "nick of time" prevented a serious fire last Monday when the roof of Willis Cady's house caught on fire from sparks from the fireplace flue. The blaze was discovered by Paul Ringle who happened to be working on an electric light pole nearby and he gave the alarm to which a number of citizens responded, extinguishing the blaze without much damage. Only the hole in the roof and some water-soaked plaster testified to what could have happened, as a strong east wind was blowing at the time.
