VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

COOKIES

In grandmother's time, every household had its cookie jar, and the memory of that famous jar is one of the bright spots in life. In many ways, we are drifting away from some of the good old customs, but if there are growing children in the family, or lunch boxes to pack, the cookie jar is just one old time custom it would be a pity to discard. Every family enjoys their own favorite cookies, but they also like new and different kinds of cookies occasionally.

There are two types of cookies: those which are a stiff cake batter and are dropped from a spoon on to a baking sheet are called Drop Cookies. These are the more easily and quickly made but cannot be shaped. Drop cookies require a moderate oven to start with in baking to allow them to spread. A hot oven causes the crust to form before it has the opportunity of spreading. For this reason the Drop Cookies are placed about two inches apart on the baking sheet.

Rolled cookies are made of a stiff dough which can be rolled very thin and cut in various shapes. After mixing, the dough should be chilled to roll to the best advantage.

Children delight in fancy shapes and they should certainly have them sometimes. The cookies may be cut into fancy shapes with a floured knife. Gingerbread men are shaped in this way. They are always favorites with children and can be made realistic by using raisins for eyes, nose and buttons; and bits of frosting for mouth and trimming.

Cookies are a wholesome means of satisfying the child's natural craving for sweets. They are so much more nourishing than to allow the child to eat candy.

In baking, a very moderate oven is used for chocolate, molasses, or fruit cookies.

The following easily prepared recipes may offer variety with the favorites you have at the present time.

Drop Cookies—One-fourth cup butter, one-half cup sugar, 2 eggs, one cup flour, one teaspoon vanilla flavoring, one teaspoon lemon flavoring. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, beating thoroughly, then add one egg unbeaten, mixing until batter is smooth, add one-half cup flour, beat well, then add one egg and continue beating; add remainder of flour and flavoring. Drop with a teaspoon on a greased baking sheet, about three inches apart. Bake in moderate oven for fifteen minutes.

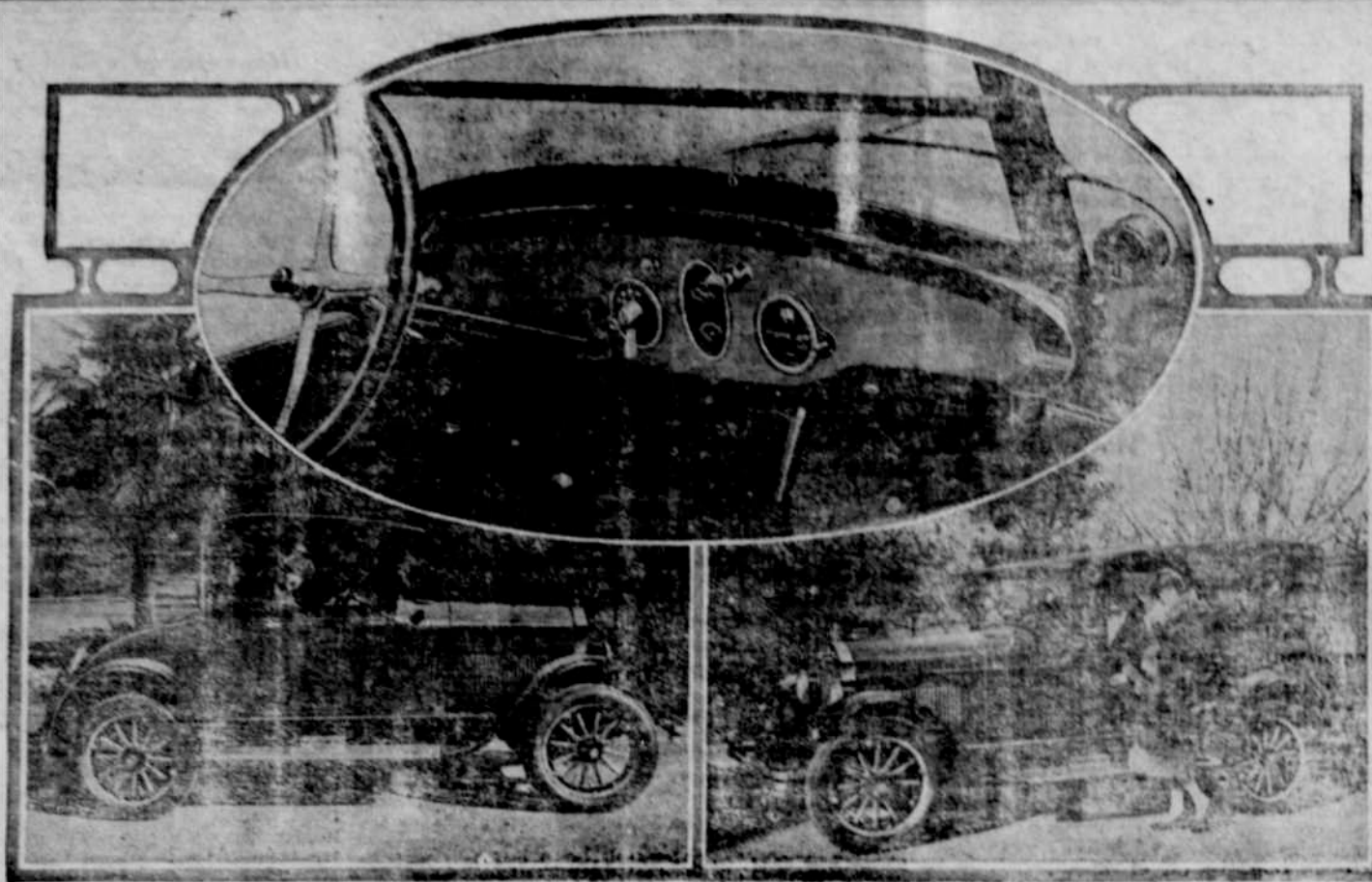
Walnut Wafers—One cup of flour, one cup of walnut, one cup of sugar, one cup of butter, one cup of vanilla, one cup of raisins, one cup of chocolate, one cup of nuts, one cup of soda, one cup of baking powder, one cup of salt, one cup of cinnamon, one cup of ginger, one cup of nutmeg. Follow usual method of mixing. Drop by teaspoons on a buttered cookie sheet about three inches apart. Bake in moderate oven fifteen minutes.

Chocolate Drop Cookies—One cup brown sugar, one-half cup of flour, one-half cup of milk, one egg, one-half cup of vanilla, one-half cup of chocolate, one-half cup of soda, one-half cup of baking powder, one-half cup of salt, one-half cup of cinnamon, one-half cup of ginger, one-half cup of nutmeg. Mix butter and sugar, add well-beaten egg and vanilla. Lastly add sifted dry ingredients and flavoring and nuts. Drop by a teaspoon on a greased baking sheet, about three inches apart. Bake in a moderate oven.

Rolled Cookies
Hermits—One-third cup shortening, two eggs, one cup of brown sugar, two and one-half cups flour, one-half teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon soda, one teaspoon cinnamon, one teaspoon baking powder, one teaspoon nutmeg, one-half teaspoon cloves, one cup seedless raisins, one-half cup chopped walnuts. Cream shortening, add sugar, sift all remaining dry ingredients. Add well-beaten eggs to butter and sugar; mix well, add dry material, then roll out and cut in any desired shape. Bake in a moderate oven.

Sugar Cookies—One-half cup butter, one cup sugar, 2 eggs, one cup flour, one teaspoon baking powder, one teaspoon vanilla. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, beating well, then two eggs yolks and one white, beat on until light; add flour sifted with baking powder. Let stand to chill, then toss on a floured board, and roll one-eighth inch thick. Cut with a doughnut cutter. Brush over with the white until very creamy, then unbleached white of egg, sprinkle with butter, flavoring, chopped fruit and rolled oats. Drop in a moderate oven for ten minutes.

Rolled O.T. Macaroons—One cup sugar, two eggs, one tablespoon melted butter, one cup of chopped raisins or dates, two cups rolled oats, one teaspoon vanilla. Beat eggs well with-out separation; add sugar gradually until very creamy, then unbleached white of egg, sprinkle with butter, flavoring, chopped fruit and rolled oats. Drop in a moderate oven for ten minutes.

Sulfur pays on most Oregon alfalfa lands in the semi-arid sections, the O. A. C. experiment station has found. Recent investigations indicate a need of increasing the sulfate content of the soil solution for certain soils especially early in the growing season. Sulfur improves the reaction of arid soils for neutral. It aids in reclamation of alkali land and brings calcium and other bases into solution in the soil moisture. Alfalfa is a heavy feeder on calcium.

to indicate a line of action which will bring a realization of what our slogan visions.

As previously suggested, our opportunities are educational, industrial, economic and social. Along all of these lines there is a crying need for unity of effort.

In educational matters Eastern Washington County suffers along with the rest of the rural parts of the state though being divided up into small school districts with weak and relatively inefficient schools. This condition is a relic of pioneer days of far divided communities, poor roads and slow means of travel and transportation.

With all our modern conveniences of good roads and rapid communication, with all our new efficient methods in business we retain the antiquated system of educational administration of 100 and 150 years ago. If other conditions traveled as slowly as our educational administration we would still be swinging a scythe in the field, sending our produce to market in an ox-cart, and getting our news from the town crier.

The East and Middle West have awakened to the backwardness of our wretched educational quagmire. Thousands of districts each year are being consolidated and in the place of inefficient one and two roomed schools are springing up large consolidated schools which are possessed by city children. I do not mean the same kind of training, but training equally efficient along lines peculiar to our own conditions and needs.

No community in Oregon is more favorably situated for assuming educational leadership and bringing together the scattered educational units of the community and binding them together in one strong educational institution, a consolidated school, than Beaverton. When this can be done with a distinct money-saving to the whole community (to Beaverton of at least \$10,000 a year) and at the same time give increased effi-

ciency, nothing but pure folly could cause us to remain idle. Data on this matter has been gathered and fully studied out and will be presented in subsequent articles.

For progress in industrial and social matters a live Chamber of Commerce is indispensable. The history of such an organization in Beaverton is largely a record of its births and demises. Only a cursory glance is needed to show the reason, which is that the well worked out systems of successful Chamber of Commerce can bring home seekers here, can bring industries here, can bring trade here, and, in bringing these, bring prosperity.

We have been told that Beaverton is too close to Portland to bring farmers here for marketing. This is not true, as is proven by the experience of scores of other towns in all parts of the country similarly situated. The farmer buys where he sells and where he obtains credit. We may benefit from the solution found by other communities.

Civic improvement is another urgent need of the town, and that is as appropriate work for other civic bodies as for a Chamber of Commerce. One who looks ahead is impressed by the fact that many of our streets are too narrow and that no systematic effort at tree and shrub planting is carried out. A Watson Street or a Lombard St. Improvement Association could make these streets with little expense beautiful drives that would in a few years be the pride of the town. Other towns smaller and larger than Beaverton are doing these things.
