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Charleston Revue At Theatre

GUERNSEY GROWERS HOLD MEETING

The Washington County Guernsey Cattle club in its annual meeting at the Laurel Community hall today elected Sam H. Hult of Hillsboro, president; Ed Rieben of Banks, vice-president; and O. T. McWhorter, Hillsboro, secretary-treasurer.

J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner, discussed the topic, "The most important question before the American farmer," stressing co-operative marketing, and urged the farmers to get together in groups to help solve their own questions and for the purpose of developing the production of certain commodities in a given district. Mr. Mickle also urged the breeders to participate in the exhibits at local and state fairs as well as the Pacific International Livestock show.

George N. Angel, of the Oregon Farmer, suggested that the association foster cow testing association work, and pointed out the advantages to be gained.

F. L. Brown, the newly appointed county fair manager, spoke on the necessity of having the support of the breed associations in putting across a strong county fair.

The Guernsey club will appoint a county fair committee to work with the management in bringing out as strong a Guernsey exhibit as is possible to do.

The ladies of the Guernsey club served an excellent banquet in the community hall during the noon hour.

RELIGIOUS CONFERENCE TO BE HELD

Problems in religious work at the University of Oregon will receive a thoroughgoing discussion at a two-day conference to be held on the campus Feb. 11 and 12. Student religious workers, faculty members interested in the work, clergymen of the city, and several religious workers throughout the state will have a part in the sessions.

The idea in the conference is that all those interested in this sort of work on the campus may get together to discuss aims and methods and ways and means.

The conference will not be a mass meeting, but of course those students or townspeople who wish to attend the sessions may do so. It is primarily for the discussion of individual problems.

The program for the meeting has not yet been fully worked out, but the meeting is sure to prove worthwhile to anyone interested in this work.

Building operations in Bend during 1925 totaled \$114,425.

REPLY TO MR.

SWENSON'S LETTER

To the Editor: As I do not believe in slinging personalities, unless they are bouquets, by means of newspaper columns, I shall not answer Mr. Swenson's letter as I might be justified in doing. As his criticism seems to spring more from misunderstanding than from antagonism, I will content myself with setting the matter right before the public who may have fallen into error because of Mr. Swenson's letter.

There was no criticism of the Beaverton school in this article as Beaverton is hardly to be considered a rural school. My remarks included the ADMINISTRATION of all schools in rural sections of the State. I might have said in most states and extended it to foreign countries as well, only I did not think it necessary to be so inclusive.

Also, my remarks mentioned Educational Administration as being backward, whereas Mr. Swenson construes this as Educational Methods. No one familiar in the least with educational terms would have made this mistake, for the two terms have wholly different meanings.

The Educational Methods used in the Oregon schools are those used in all schools the country over, and Oregon ranks high in this respect. Beaverton is not behind other cities and towns in this respect, 2788 towns in Oregon and our teachers are as up-to-date in their methods as any in the state.

As to my remarks on the Chamber of Commerce, without disparaging any work done by any one of them. The fact that there has been 4 or 5 in a period of ten years justifies the remark made.

Superintendent To Enter primary

Mrs. Emma Bryant Pledges Herself in Favor of More Equitable Taxation-Has Experience

I hereby announce my candidacy for the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction to succeed Mr. J. A. Churchill, resigned. I will enter the May Republican Primaries.

I am forty-two years of age, a married woman and the mother of four children, three of whom are attending college in this state and one attending high school. St. Paul, Minnesota, is my birthplace but I was reared in the city of Portland, Oregon, coming there at the age of five years. I attended the public schools of that city, being a graduate of the old Portland High School located at Fourteenth and Morrison Streets.

I have had many years of experience in the rural schools of this state and the state of Washington as well as experience in the city schools. I have served as principal of a city school and am now serving my fifth year as superintendent of schools of Washington County.

One of the big problems before the people of Oregon today is to devise a more equitable tax division for school administration purposes. If elected, I will put forth all possible effort to meet this problem, and will do my utmost to further all the educational interests of the state. Another big problem which will occupy me will be the problem of equalizing educational opportunities between the urban and the rural child.

I am a member of the Congregational Church, of the Women's Auxiliary to the Spanish-American War Veterans, of the local, county and state grange, of our local Women's Club and Parent-Teacher Association. I am president of the State Association of County School Superintendents.
