Large shipments of eastern corn which have been coming west for the last several years show that there is a field in some sections for expanding the corn acreage, and that in western Oregon there is a large opportunity for growing more Hanchen barley. Feeders of larger kinds of livestock have recognized the merit of Hanchen for a number of years, but now poultrymen are beginning to use it in considerable
