Household Dep't

VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD
RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Cocoa Cake—One cup sugar,
one-half cup shortening, one
egg, one cup buttermilk, two
cups flour, one teaspoon soda
dissolved in milk, one heaping
teaspoon baking powder, five
teaspoons cocoa, a little salt,
and vanilla. Cream shortening
and sugar, add the beaten egg
and then the dry ingredients,
sifted together, alternately with
the buttermilk in which the
soda has been dissolved, and
the vanilla last.

Plain Cake—One-half cup of
butter, one cup sugar, 2 eggs,
one-half cup sweet milk, one
and one-half cups flour, one
teaspoon vanilla or any pre-
ferred flavor, one teaspoon of
baking powder. Beat the but-
ter and sugar to a cream; add
the eggs one at a time, beating
well after each egg is added to
the sugar and butter. Then
add the milk, flour, and flavor-
ing, and lastly the baking pow-
der. Beat thoroughly after add-
ing each ingredient. Bake in
layers and fill with marshmal-
low frosting. This makes two
layers in nine-inch tins.

Easy Frosting—Put one egg
white into a bowl of double boil-
ing water, with one cup sugar and 3
tablespoons cold water. Beat a
little before putting over boil-
ing water, so that none of the
white is lost. Beat until of the
right consistency. This makes
enough frosting for a three-
layer cake. This frosting can
be varied by the addition of
raisins, chopped nuts, choco-
late, or various shades of color-
ing.

Devil's Food Cake—2 squares
of chocolate in one-fourth cup
boiling water, two eggs, one
cup sugar, one-half cup sour
milk, one-half cup shortening,
one and one-half cups flour,
one teaspoon soda, one tea-
spoon vanilla. Mix in the usu-
al order. This makes two lay-
ers in nine-inch tins, or may
be made into a loaf if desired.

Spice Cake—Two cups brown
sugar, one-half cup butter or
substitute (scent measurement),
two whole eggs, one yolk, one
cup sour milk, two teaspoons
of cinnamon, one teaspoon nut-
meg, one teaspoon allspice,
one-half teaspoon cloves, one
teaspoon soda, two cups flour.
This may be made in loaf or
layers. It makes three large
layers.

costing almost as much as they
do now.

When he started working
with the Company Mr. Fields
was Superintendent. He has
worked at different occupations,
that of section laborer, section
foreman, extra gang laborer,
extra gang foreman, night
watchman, etc. The railroad
company hired Greeks, Italians,
Chinamen, etc. While working
with the different nationalities
Mr. Watts found that the Chin-
amen were the most honest. They
were a little slower than the
others, but would do what you
told them to, and could be de-
pended upon. About fifty years
ago the railroad company im-
ported a lot of Chinamen for
railroad work. The foreigners
worked for the railroads until
about 1906, and then Ameri-
cans were more generally em-
ployed on the sections, etc.

"Mr. Watts recalls a wreck
that happened at Hillsboro,
when an extra freight ran into
a regular freight. The cause of
it was that the crew on the ex-
tra freight were looking off 'o
one side at the girls working
in the hop yards, and did not
notice the regular freight ahead
of them, and smashed into it."
It is the regular policy of the
Southern Pacific to retire their
employees at the age of 70 years
and to give them a pension
proportionate to the wages
they were receiving during their
employment.

HUGE GROWTH IN SCHOOL SAVINGS

New York.—School savings in the
United States for the year 1924-1925
increased in aggregate bank balance
by \$5,500,000, with a growth of \$20,000
in the total number of pupils partici-
pating. It is shown in reports made to
the American Bankers Association,
which declares that the returns en-
courage belief in the permanence of
school savings as a part of the edu-
cational program in the public schools.

During the year the number of re-
porting school savings systems in-
creased from 653 in 742 districts to
743 in 1,537 districts, the number of
schools from 8,040 to 10,163, the num-
ber of pupils participating from 2,236,
326 to 2,869,497, the deposits from
\$14,391,525.40 to \$16,941,560.72 and the
bank balances from \$20,435,144.64 to
\$25,913,431.15, says W. E. Albigh, in
charge of the Association's savings
activities.

Since 1920, the first year for which
comprehensive statistics are available,
the number of schools having school
savings banking has increased 271.1
per cent, the enrollment in school sav-
ings districts 278.9 per cent, partici-
pants 320.2 per cent, deposits 506.1
per cent and bank balances 516.8 per
cent.

The more recently adopted method
of killing the common barberry which
spreads black stem rust of small
grains is by the use of such chemi-
cals as salt and kerosene, according to
the Department of Agriculture. These
methods have several advan-
tages over the digging method for-
merly used. They are less laborious,
cheaper and more certain. This is
especially true if bushes are growing
in stony ground where digging is dif-
ficult. Department Circular 356 tells
all about how to use this method.—
Banker-Farmer.

POULTRY NOTES

A farm without poultry is a finan-
cial mistake.

A turkey hen can cover from fifteen
to twenty eggs during incubation.

Raising geese, exclusively, would
hardly be found profitable. The lay-
ing season is too short, lasting only
about two months.

Without a good wash before them
all the time your hens will fall short
in egg production.

The free use of kerosene or crude
oil on the roost and in the cracks in
your poultry house will help to exter-
minate mites.

Watch for any bad habits among
your layers. If you find any broken
egg shells around on the floors, make
an effort to locate the guilty one and
try to break up the habit or dispose
of the offender.

Don't take your sick chickens to
market. They soon die in the fatten-
ing crates after exposing hundreds of
others to the disease.

Whether or not electric lights are
used to increase egg production, sun-
light still ranks first as the cheapest
disinfectant that can be used in the
poultry house.

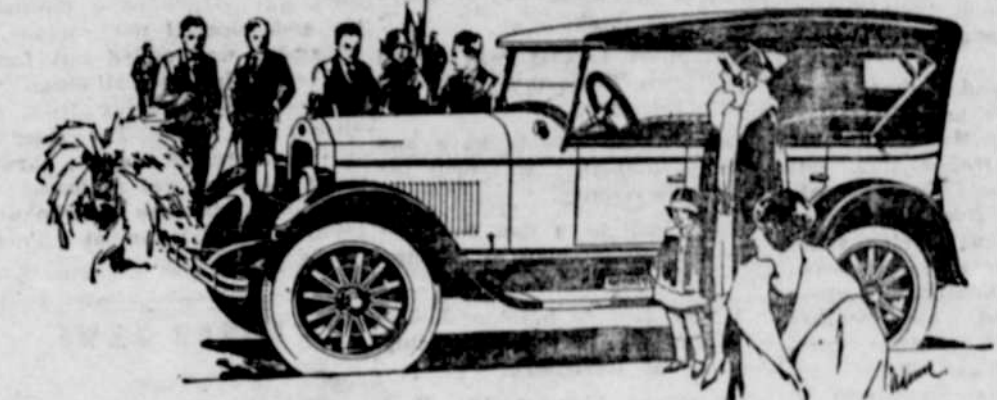
