(Continued from front page). was represented by two poems in the American Literary Anthology for 1925, and will have a poem in the Bookfellow's Anthology for 1926. His name was also mentioned by Braithwaite in his anthology for 1925 as one of the six poets representative of the Northwest.

He is preeminently a lyricist. He has the simplicity that goes with lyric poetry, and he is always sincere. Perhaps much of his work so far is frail. It is like the fragile essence of a summer flower, while poetry to

endure must also have the vigour of a tree. With his marvelous touch and fine technique, it is not too much to believe that he will be the most famous of our Northwestern poets. With a greater appreciation of his own background and experiences, perhaps he can picture this section as Frost has New England.

He is a member of the American Literary Association, The Bookfellow's, and the Northwest Poetry society, serving the latter as treasurer. He is cordial and modest, and sincere in his efforts to give his best to the power of winged words.

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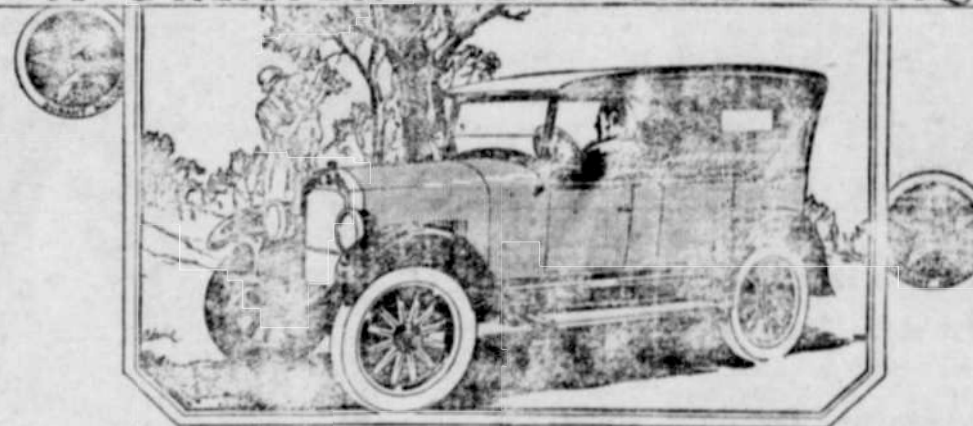
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
