SEASONABLE FOODS.

If you enjoy tripe, you know that it is without waste, easily digested and reasonable in price.
When selecting, take the tender pickled tripe, wash in cold water and cut into uniform slices. Dry in a cloth, then put in sifted cornmeal. Have ready a hot pan with two or three tablespoons of hot fat. Lay in the tripe and cook until lightly browned on one side, then turn and brown on the other side. Serve with boiled buttered onions.
Apricot Sponge.—Soften a tablespoonful of gelatin in one-fourth of a cupful of water and dissolve in one cupful of apricot juice and pulp, heated hot. Add one-fourth of a cupful of sugar, stir until dissolved, then when the mixture begins to thicken, add two stiffly beaten egg whites. Serve in glass cups with sweetened whipped cream. Prunes may be used in place of apricots for variety.
Baked Ham.—Take a two-inch slice of ham from the center of the ham. Place in a baking pan and parboil with water to cover. Drain, spread with brown sugar and mustard, using a teaspoonful of mustard to two tablespoonfuls of brown sugar. Cover with the mixture, add the water from the pan and bake, basting often until the ham is tender.
Scalloped Potatoes With Meat.—Prepare a dish of scalloped potatoes, using plenty of butter and milk, cover with a layer of chopped meat, any leftover, and bake for an hour or more until the potatoes are thoroughly done. Serve from the baking dish.
Another way of using such leftover meat is to slice the potatoes, adding a fine sprinkling of onion; add a cupful of tomato and the meat, either ground or left in neat pieces. Have the tomatoes on top to keep the moisture in the meat. With seasonings and slow baking this is a very tasty dish. Serve sprinkled with a few cooked peas for a garnish. Serve from the baking dish. Such dishes are nice for a busy day, as they form the main dish.

Good Things.
The following cakes and cookies are good as long as they last. Doughnuts made with honey keep well and are moist much longer than those prepared with sugar.
Honey Doughnuts.—Take two eggs, one and one-half cupfuls of strained honey, one cupful of sour milk, three tablespoonfuls of melted butter, one teaspoonful of soda, two teaspoonfuls of cream of tartar, and add a little salt. Roll as soft as possible and fry in deep fat.
Spice Cookies.—Cream one-third of a cupful of butter, add one-half cupful of sugar, and one cupful of molasses in which one teaspoonful of soda has been dissolved. Add three and one-half cupfuls of flour, cloves, cinnamon and nutmeg to taste, with one-half of a whole cupful of chopped raisins. Add a few chopped nuts if liked. When well mixed drop by spoonfuls on greased baking sheets. Sprinkle with sugar and bake.
Orange Cake.—Beat well the yolks of five eggs, add half of a cupful of water, two cupfuls of sugar, beating until well blended. Add two and one-half cupfuls of flour sifted with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, add the juice and grated rind of one orange and fold in the well beaten whites of three eggs. Bake in layers, and ice with the following: To the two remaining whites, beaten stiff, add powdered sugar together with orange juice and the grated rind until the icing is of the right consistency to spread.
Chocolate Potato Cake.—Blend two-thirds of a cupful of shortening with two cupfuls of sugar; add two-thirds of a cupful of grated chocolate and one cupful of warm mashed potatoes, one cupful each of seeded raisins and chopped nuts, one-half cupful of milk and two and one-half cupfuls of flour sifted with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Add four eggs, whites and yolks beaten separately, one-half teaspoonful each of cloves and nutmeg and a teaspoonful of cinnamon. If baked in a loaf in a slow oven in a paper lined pan for one hour, it will keep a month.
Tongue and Eggs Tartare.—Cut the desired number of slices of cold boiled tongue into rounds, and on top of each place a half-inch slice of tomato. Cut hard cooked eggs crosswise and place a half with the yolk side down on each round. Top the egg with one tablespoonful of sauce tartare and garnish with watercress. When tomatoes are unavailable use tomato catsup spread over the tongue.
Chocolate Cookies.—Take one cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of shortening, one-half cupful of sour milk, one and one-half cupfuls of flour, one-half cupful of walnuts, one egg, one-half teaspoonful of soda and two squares of grated chocolate.

SUITABLE DRESS FOR SCHOOL OR BUSINESS

Appropriateness is the keynote of good dressing. The smartest tailored suit is out of place at an evening function and a dress suitable for an afternoon tea is not the right selection for business or school wear. Nevertheless it is quite common to see a girl in a thin beaded dress bending over a typewriter, or a high school girl in a fancy silk or georgette frock busy with a powder puff instead of her Latin grammar.

These mistakes in costume do not usually occur because the wearers have no other choice in a meager wardrobe. Often the unsuitable costume is quite expensive. Sometimes the wrong kind of dress was bought in the first place or a left-over party dress is being worn out. Bad selection, sometimes accompanied by other mistakes in shoes, hat, and accessories, is due in part to slavish imitation of what other girls wear and, in a great many cases, to a girl's longing for something that seems beautiful, without any understanding of the principles of good taste.
Step in Right Direction.
The first step in the right direction is to learn what is appropriate and beautiful in dress, says the United States Department of Agriculture. Many girls are of the opinion that only a party dress is pretty, but such is not the case. A costume that is appropriate for work or school may be very charming. If it is simple in design, harmonious in color from hat to shoes, made of durable materials, leaving the wearer free to do what she has to do without thinking of her dress at all, it is appropriate. Such a costume may be inexpensive and yet reflect good taste in every detail. The dress may be comfortable and of pleasing color, not too somber, and not too light for the season, made of practical, durable material that does not soil easily. Materials that are very satisfactory for winter wear are tweeds, charmeuse, French serge, jersey, challie, flannel, and so forth, while tissue ginghams, English prints, linens, wash silks, and so forth, are very suitable for summer wear. The design of this dress should be as simple and becoming as possible, without elaborate or showy trimming. It should be planned to slip on quickly without complicated fastenings.

Hat Worn Plain.
The hat worn with it will have to go out in all kinds of weather, so it will be plain and fairly close fitting, with almost no trimming. Of course it will harmonize in color with the dress or any coat that is worn. When the same hat has to be worn with almost everything, great care must be given to its selection. A gray hat, for instance, does not usually harmonize well with browns and tans in coat or dress, or in shoes and stockings, but requires a different set of color tones in the rest of the costume, such as blue, black, or deep purple. A leafy green or a black hat can be worn with a great many other shades. If one must have an economical wardrobe, as most girls must, it is a good rule to think of it as a whole, and buy articles that can be worn interchangeably with good effect, even if one seems to tend very much to one set of shades.
Shoes for school or business wear should look businesslike, and not suggest dancing. They should, of course, be carefully fitted. Approved types of shoes have straight inner lines, give room for the toes to spread, have low heels, and allow the wearer to stand erect. They are the same sort a girl would choose for a hike or for any sport not requiring special shoes.

Right and Wrong Way.
The illustration shows two girls coming out of high school. It's easy to pick out the one who is appropriately dressed, isn't it? The girl in the draped satin and elaborate hat is so conscious of her appearance that she has to stop and look in her mirror. It would be difficult to guess how she gets into her complicated dress, or how long she takes to complete her toilet. One can at least be sure that she is not going for a tramp in those high-heeled satin slippers, which cramp her toes and throw her body out of balance. On the other hand, what high school or business girl would not admire the simplicity of the costume of the other figure? Her dress is most attractive and is so well designed that it will not go out of style quickly.

Temperature for Milk
The best temperature for keeping milk is 50 degrees F. or less, and good milk kept as cool as that should remain sweet for 12 hours at least and ordinarily 24 hours or more, after it reaches the consumer. If ice cannot be obtained, an iceless refrigerator or some such device is a help, even though a temperature as low as 50 degrees F. can rarely be maintained in it.
Cutting bread lengthwise instead of across saves about two-thirds of the waste, especially when sandwiches are to be cut in fancy shapes.
Watercress sauce for beef is made by cutting the cress fine and stirring it into half a cupful of apple jelly which has been beaten with a silver fork.
