LIST OF MINERAL

DEPOSITS WANTED

More than 400 western mineral deposits listed by the geological department of the Southern Pacific company are being brought to the attention of manufacturers throughout the United States and owners are already realizing substantial profits as a result of this service.

Now G. J. Sneloff, chief geologist for the company, asks that others who know of unlisted non-metallic mineral deposits anywhere in Oregon get into communication with him. It is desired to circulate full information concerning all such deposits to thousands of potential users of the mineral involved.
