In last week's issue we spoke
of the "System." Some of the
things brought out in our school
meeting may be used to illus-
trate part of what we mean by
the word system. Those who
attended the school meeting no-
ticed that the items put on the
board were under certain heads
or for certain purposes.

If the law required that the
Clerk's report be published, it
would help to show the point
I shall attempt to make, but we
believe that the Clerk's books are
open for inspection by whom-
ever wishes to look at them. If
you will take the books and
compare the headings with the
headings on the Annual Budget
published in the Review last fall
you will find that they in no
way coincide. The Budget
Board is called in, and the tax
voted for certain purposes. An
itemized statement is published,
called a budget, but there is
nothing which compels the
Board to use the money for the
purpose stated in the budget.

In a talk with Mr. Churchill,
State Superintendent of Public
Instruction, he told your Editor
that the Board were not re-
quired to spend the money as
it was listed on the budget; in
other words, that the district
could vote \$5,000 for teachers'
salaries and the Board would be
entirely within their rights in
spending that money for any-
thing they pleased, so long as it
was for the maintenance of the
school. How's that for system?

We want to mention just one
subject that is taught in the
schools—geography, a study of
the earth and the people who
live on it. The little chap enter-
ing school knows something of
geography before he even gets
inside the school room, espe-
cially if he lives outside of a
metropolitan district. He has
seen the flowers, the trees, the
birds, the bees, the butterflies,
has seen the rain come down,
the sun shine, the plants grow.
Many of the marvels of nature
are to him commonplace—until
he gets into the geography
class, when about the first thing
that's shot at him is that the
earth is round, the ground on
which he stands is part of the
surface of a ball, that the rev-
olutions of the earth about the
sun makes the seasons, that the
earth's rotation causes day and
night, and a few of these facts
which I defy anyone to demon-
strate to a 7-year-old child so
that the child can understand
him—and they call that "teach-
ing" geography.

To carry this statement just
a little bit further, too many
people think of the accumula-
tion of facts or the listing of
certain statements as education.
If you will pause a minute you
will see that education is not
so easily defined.

We think of the teacher as
educated when she has gone
through high school and had a
year of normal training, but
the physician who went through
the same high school, who
spent four years in taking his
academic degree from some ac-
credited college, and who spent
four more years in studying
for his M. D., when he starts in
practice is considered a person
who must be taken on suffer-
ance, one who has to demon-
strate his ability, while the
teacher with seven years' less
training, is accepted as educa-
ted. The same thing that ap-
plies to the physician applies
to the lawyer.

In our next article we will at-
tempt a definition of education.

BANKERS SURVEY STATE BANK LAWS

Find That Movement for State
Guaranty of Bank Has
Gone Into Eclipse.

New York.—A survey of state bank
ing laws conducted by the State Bank
Division of the American Bankers As-
sociation shows marked progress to-
ward greater uniformity and more ef-
ficient bank supervision, it is declared
by Frank W. Simmonds, in charge of
the division, in a statement giving the
results of the investigation. He says
that the movement for state guaranty
of bank deposits appears to have gone
into eclipse.

"The division has urged that the
office of bank commissioner be freed
from politics and all other functions
of state government and tenure be
made more secure with sufficient com-
pensation and discretion to attract
men of outstanding ability," Mr. Sim-
monds says. "Gratifying progress has
been made during the past year in im-
portant bank legislation in many
states. Idaho, Wyoming and Oregon
led the list by adopting entirely new
modern banking codes, while Texas
and Montana have new codes in prepa-
ration.

Uniformity Among State Laws
"The survey shows that it is gen-
erally agreed there should be a high de-
gree of uniformity among the states in
laws dealing with certain funda-
mental principles of bank organiza-
tion, regulation and supervision, and
that there is a strong tendency in this
direction. We find a very definite
trend toward increasing the minimum
capital requirements of banks to \$25,
000; creation of banking boards to act
in an advisory capacity with the state
bank commissioner, and legislation
empowering bank commissioners to
take complete charge of insolvent
banks and to liquidate them as dis-
tinguished from liquidation through
the courts.

"We find also a trend toward leg-
islation providing for closer supervision
and regulation of building and loan as-
sociations; more equitable taxation of
bank stock; legislation providing for
merger, conversion or consolidation of
banking institutions; the legalizing
and regulating of what is known as
'departmental banking'; broadening
the field for investment of funds of
savings banks and trust companies, and
increasing the power of the bank com-
missioner as to granting or denying
charters for new banks, and authoriz-
ing his making reasonable rules and
regulations governing bank manage-
ment and prescribing penalties for the
violation thereof.

"Additional general characteristics
of state bank legislation are for in-
creasing the compensation of the bank
commissioner and lengthening his
term of office of four, five or six years,
with power to appoint necessary de-
puties and examiners; legislation provid-
ing for the reduction of mandatory
bank calls to three and reducing the
number of examinations required by
law annually to one; making issuance
of worthless checks a misdemeanor;
limiting or prohibiting an officer or di-
rector of a bank borrowing from his
bank unless his collateral is approved
by a majority of the board of direc-
tors, and limiting or prohibiting the
opening of branch banks.

Eclipse of Guaranty Movement
"The question of state guaranty of
bank deposits appears this year to
have passed into an eclipse, so far as
the extension of the idea is concerned,
notwithstanding the fact that state
guaranty laws were recommended by
the governors of two states, and bills
were introduced in several of the
states, all of which were defeated.
The general tendency, so far as state
guaranty of deposits laws are con-
cerned, is distinctly the other way, the
indications being that several states
now having guaranty laws are trying
to free themselves from this legisla-
tion. Oklahoma has abandoned the
plan of state guaranty of deposits, and
this year the South Dakota legisla-
ture has repealed the state guaranty
law and has referred the repeal to the
people at the next general election for
ratification."

FARM REMINDERS

The following rules, accord-
ing to the O. A. C. experiment
station, serve as a guide to the
feeding of Oregon dairy cows:
1. Feed all the roughness
they will eat up clean at all
times.
2. Feed one pound of grain
per day for each pound of
butterfat produced per week, or
one pound grain daily for each
three pounds of milk.
3. Feed as much as the cows
will take without gaining in
weight.

Heat is successfully used to
destroy insects in small
amounts of grain or similar
products by the Oregon experi-
ment station. The material is
put in a shallow baking pan
and placed in the oven for one
hour. The temperature is reg-
ulated by placing a pan of water
in the oven. This is kept close
to the boiling point but not al-
lowed to boil. This treatment
destroys the germination of
seed and is not safe for rising
flour. If seed is intended for
planting, the temperature is
kept between 130° F. and
145° F.
