OH, EDUCATION, HOW MANY SINS ARE COMMITTED IN THY NAME!

The Spartan youth was placed
out in the cold and exposed to
all sorts of hardships that he
might be educated. The Indian
youth is handled much the same
way to this day that he may
be trained to be a great brave.
The modern mother dolls up
her four-year-old daughter and
sets her up on a stool ordering
her not to stir so that she may
look "nice" when she, the moth-
er, gets dressed and parades the
streets, either with the daugh-
ter, or the daughter with a
nurse—and each process is a
part of the child's education.

Here in Beaverton we send the
child to school so that he
"learn" and we berate the
schools if the child does not
learn the things that were
drilled into the child mind a
quarter or a half century ago.
No one today would think of
hitching up an ox team and
driving it to Portland though
they want the child taught the
same things and in the same
manner that it was taught when
the ox team was the only means
of transportation.

ter teacher.

A "Correct" Likeness of Washington



This heroic statue of the commander-in-chief of the first armies of the
United States was made for the city of Portland, Oregon, though not yet deliv-
ered there by the artist. The western municipality has loaned it to the
Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition, opening in Philadelphia June 1
and continuing until December 1, to celebrate 150 years of American indepen-
dence. At the foot of the sculpture is shown Pompey Coppini, the sculptor.
Dr. Henry Waldo Poe, of Portland, declares the face to be the most correct
likeness of Washington ever modeled.

INSIDE INFORMATION

DON'T WOUND PLANTS

Avoid wounding or breaking
plants when cultivating or work-
ing around them. In harvest-
ing fruits and vegetables to be
stored, avoid bruising, as de-
cay most frequently begins
where the protective covering is
broken. Certain insects, such
as the potato tuber moth, gain
access at points of injury.

ILL-SHAPED UDDERS

Bucket-fed calves often ac-
quire the habit of sucking each
other. The vice has several
harmful possibilities. In the
case of heifer calves, the result
may be ill-shaped and pendu-
lous udders which detract ser-
iously from the beauty and val-
ue of the animals when mat-
ure. Also there is danger, es-
pecially in the case of well-
bred dairy heifers, that sucking
of the udders will stimulate
virgin milk secretion. In time
this milk secretion dries up and
a ruined udder is the result.
Many cases of chronic garget
or hardened udders reported
among virgin heifers are no
doubt due to the sucking habit.

Keeping the calves secure in
stanchions for a time after
feeding from the buckets will
tend to reduce the desire to
suck when turned loose. A
handful of grain given imme-
diately after the calves have
finished their milk will also
help to remove the desire to
nurse.

ROTATION MEANS FOOD

The rotation of crops is near-
ly as effective in increasing
soil productivity as is the use
of farm manures and complete
fertilizers, as based on experi-
mental yields of wheat, corn,
and oats, taken collectively.
When rotation and the use of
fertilizers are practiced togeth-
er the one practice adds to the
benefits of the other, and in-
creased yields are greater than
from either practice alone.
