H. H. Van Kleeck Passes Away

Prominent Resident of Kinton Dies
at His Home Friday After-
noon, July 30, 1926

Herbert H. Van Kleeck was
born in Wisconsin April 27,
1874, the fifth child of a large
family. He attended public
school there and in about 1887
or 1888 moved with his parents
to Nebraska, where the family
made their home until about
1902, when Mr. Van Kleeck
came to Oregon and settled on
a farm near Kinton, where he
resided until his death.

In 1911 he married Miss Car-
oline Wedeking. To them four
children were born, all of whom
survive: Mabel, aged 14; Roy,
12; Carl 9, and Clifford, 6.

Since November he has been
very poorly at his home on the
Pleasant Valley Road, and died
Friday afternoon, July 30.

The deceased was a member
of the Grange and of the M. W.
A. at Huber.

Besides his children, he is
survived by his wife; six broth-
ers, Chas., J. J., Walter, of this
vicinity, Louis of Portland, and
George and Fred, both of whom
are still in Nebraska; three sis-
ters, Mrs. Bierly and Mrs. Ward
of this vicinity, and Catherine,
of Nebraska; his mother, Helen
M. Van Kleeck of Portland; be-
sides a number of more distant
relatives.

The funeral services were
held Sunday from the Congrega-
tional Church here, part of
the services being conducted by
the M. W. A. Lodge. Rev. G.
N. Taylor preached the ser-
mon; W. E. Pegg had charge of
the arrangements. Interment
was in the Crescent Grove Cem-
etery.

The deceased was beloved by
all who knew him. The funeral
was one of the largest ever seen
in this vicinity.

He was a good husband, a
kind and loving father, and a
loyal citizen of his country.
