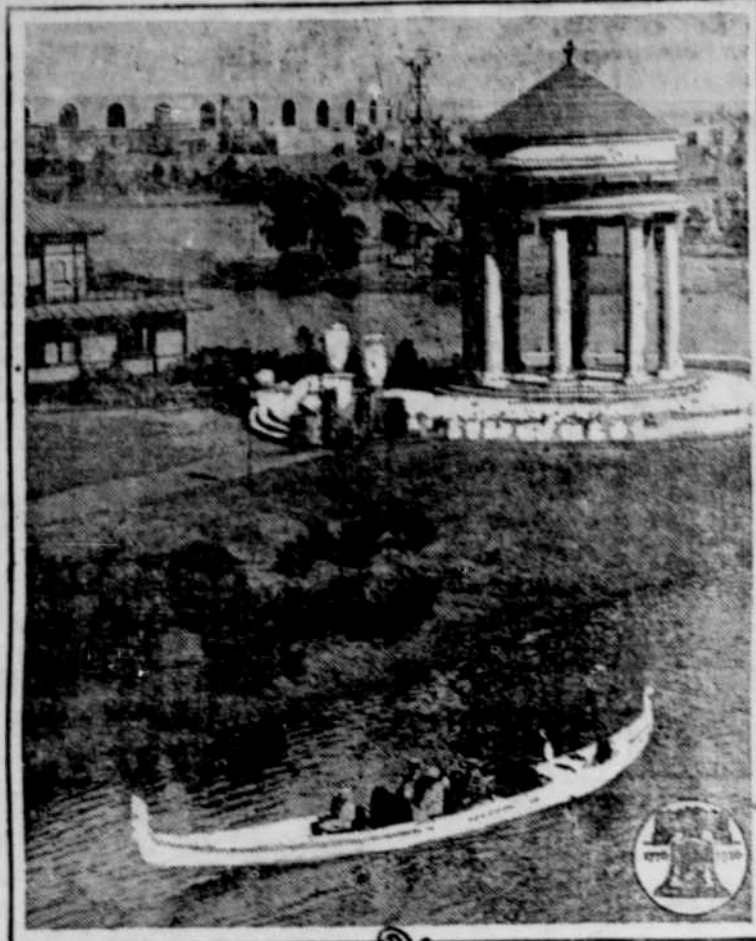


ON THE SESQUI LAGOONS

OBITUARY
Julia Margaret Raynard was born Jan. 28, 1851, at Ballingrane, Ireland.

When a girl she united with the Wesley Methodist Church, to which she remained faithful to the end.

She was united in marriage to Wm. Raynard on May 12, 1871. Three children were born to this union.

She came to America in the year 1879, settling in Beardsley, Minn., where she resided until coming to Oregon in the year 1889, in which state she has resided until death, living the greater part of this time near Scholls, Washington County, Ore.

She is survived by her husband, Wm. Raynard, her two sons, Wm. and John W., and three grandchildren, Mabel Raynard of Los Angeles, Calif., and Ruth and John Raynard of Beaverton. Her daughter Annie died in December, 1924.

She died at Smith's Hospital August 20, 1926, after undergoing a serious operation.

Funeral services were held from Pegg's Undertaking Parlor, Sunday, August 22, at 2 P. M. Interment was in the Mountain Side Cemetery, at Scholls.
