Oregon Telephone Co. Organized

Capitalization of New Utility Put
At \$600,000; W. G. Hare Is
Among Incorporators

Organization of the Oregon Telephone Co. with a capitalization of \$600,000 was announced following the filing of articles of incorporation at Salem. Senator Charles Hall, Earl W. Gates and Wm. G. Hare of Hillsboro are named as incorporators. The principal place of business is given as Portland.

Operation of five independent telephone companies in this section of the state, involved in stock purchases made by Hall and Gates during the past three weeks, will be handled by the Oregon Telephone Co., it was terms of these transfers they acquired all the stock of the Hillsboro Telephone Co., controlling interest in the McMinnville Telephone Co., Newberg Telephone Co., and Scholls Telephone Co., and a half interest in the Western Telephone and Telegraph Co. of Forest Grove.

Stock of the Oregon Telephone Co. will consist of \$400,000 common stock and \$200,000 cumulative, 7 per cent preferred stock, dividends of which will be payable quarterly.
