maybe. Anyway the girls in
this room never study, and con-
sequently I can't either, very
well. They are always laugh-
ing and talking and having a
good time, and, believe me it
is hard to concentrate on any-
thing under such conditions.

Also never mind the iron for
awhile. My new roommate may
have one, and then there will
be no use in getting one.

According to "The Review"
and also to some of the let-
ters I have been getting, Bea-
verton must have a pretty good
football team this year. Well,
so has O.A.C. Friday there is
going to be a game here with
Gonzaga University and as we
all have tickets, I suppose I'll
