LARGE NUMBER OF HONOR STUDENTS

The following information, compiled at the end of the first six-weeks, will give to a certain degree, the scholastic standing of the 256 students enrolled in the Beaverton High.

The total number of marks given the 256 students for the first six-weeks term was approximately 1000. Of these 1,000 marks, 20% were above the average, or "A" (91-100). 40% were "B" grades (85-90). 25% were "C" grades (75-84). 10% were "D" grades (70-74) while only 5% were below 70% or failing.

As a special incentive, the student who is above the average and who has three "A's", and nothing lower than a "B", grade is given a blue report card. This card is retained by the student until he falls below the standard, at which time he will receive a white card.

Twenty-one students were on the "Honor Roll" and received blue cards for the past six weeks.

STUDENT BODY ORGANIZES TORCH HONOR SOCIETY

At the last regular meeting of the student body, they decided to organize a Torch Honor Society. This society was originated by the high schools of Seattle, Washington, and has been tried in a number of the schools in Washington and Oregon. Students receiving a certain number of points during a year receive a pin. The points are given for scholarship, athletics, class and student body offices, and other school activities. There are three pins a student may earn during his high school course; a pin with one bar during his second year provided he has earned the required points during his freshman year; during his third year, he returns the first pin and receives one with two bars, on the same condition; and during his senior year he returns the second pin and receives the Torch pin, which he is entitled to keep if he has earned enough points.

In order to get the proper information for this society, each student fills out a card printed for this special purpose. On this he marks his part in various school activities. These cards are kept on file in the office for future reference. The student body feels that this organization is one which will be very beneficial to the school, in that the standards of scholarship will be raised, and the attitude of the students toward their subjects will be different.
