PEACH BLIGHT DAMAGING

Oregon peach growers suffered considerable damage to the crop this past season from the fruit spotting due to peach blight fungus. It is feared that extensive damage will result from this disease during the present fall and winter.

The only known preventative of the attacks of this fungus on dormant buds and twigs is the bordeaux mixture 4-4-50 applied so as to cover the buds and twigs completely. This is best done in summer, but it is better to put the spray on late than not at all.

Directions for preparing this mixture may be obtained from the college by request.
