## OLD RESIDENT OF SECTION CALLED TO HIS REWARD

D. R. Wheeler, who has been a resident of this section since about 1889 died suddenly at his home in Aloha, Sunday night. He was born in Calusa county, California in June, 1862, the sixth child of a family of eight children, five boys and three girls. The father owned as his donation claim the land north of Stark St. on the east side of Portland. They had gone south to California for the mother's health and Dave was the only one of the children born out of Oregon.

Later on the family moved to Santa Rosa, California and it was there that Dave got his education, grew to manhood, and married Miss Alice Hayes in 1888. He also was a student for a time in Christian college.

In 1889 the young couple came to Aloha and took up life on the McMillan D.L.C., the village of Aloha now occupying a part of their original farm.

He was a member of Beaverton Lodge No. 252 I.O.O.F. who had charge of the funeral. He was buried from the Community church at Aloha, Wednesday, November 24, in Hillsboro cemetery. W. E. Pegg of Beaverton had charge of the arrangements.

He leaves to mourn his loss, his wife, Mrs. Alice Wheeler, eleven grand-children, one son, "Tad" Wheeler, of Aloha; two daughters, Mrs. Eva Weisenbach of Portland and Mrs. Emma Weisenbach of North Plains; four brothers and one sister, besides a host of friends and neighbors who will miss him more and more as the years go past.

Mr. Wheeler was a kind and generous neighbor, a faithful friend, a tender and loving husband and a kind and indulgent father who will be missed very much by those with whom it was his habit to come in contact.

## Candidates Named For City Offices

Two Complete Tickets Nominated  
By Caucuses Which Met  
First Of Week

A Town caucus was held on Monday evening to nominate candidates for Town offices. This caucus placed in nomination, W. E. Woodruff for Mayor; G. P. Fordney and W. F. Desinger for councilmen for two years and F. W. Bishop for Recorder-Treasurer.

This ticket is to be called the "Citizens Progressive" ticket and takes as their slogan "Cheaper water for Beaverton." Another caucus called by the Town Council was held in the I.O.O.F. hall Tuesday evening. It placed in nomination W. E. Pegg for Mayor; A. E. Wilson and J. W. Raynard for Councilmen to serve two years; and George Thyng for Recorder-Treasurer. It was voted to call this the "Better Beaverton" ticket. There was no mention of a slogan to be adopted for it.

Mr. Hecox acted as chairman for the caucus Monday evening and E. E. Fisher as secretary. Tuesday evening, George Thyng acted as chairman and L. I. Myers as secretary.

We have no record of the votes cast Monday evening. Tuesday evening the candidate for nomination, and the votes cast were as follows:  
For Mayor—E. W. Woodruff, 32; W. E. Pegg, 62; blank one.  
For Councilman, first ballot two to be nominated: A. F. Wilson, 15; G. P. Fordney, 15; J. W. Raynard, 64.  
Second ballot: A. E. Wilson, 60; G. P. Fordney, 27.  
For Recorder-Treasurer: F. W. Bishop, 28; George Thyng, 63.

## Council Votes

### To Adopt Budget

### The City Water System Came In For Great Deal Of Discus- sion Pro and Con

The Town Council met in the City Hall Monday evening and voted to adopt the budget as it was advertised in these columns the past few weeks.

A considerable delegation of the resident taxpayers were on hand to take exception to the adoption and a great deal of time was taken up discussing the budget, the water situation, and other matters that concern the taxpayers of the community.

The suggestion was made that the budget be adopted excepting the money to be raised to pay the amount for the interest on the water bonds on the supposition that the shortage, or rather, the loss that the Town is now paying for would be stopped. As this would jeopardise the credit of the Town, it was not adopted.

The matter of publishing a more detailed statement of the financial condition of the Town was discussed at some length. City Attorney Allen quoted the law as applied to cities of 100,000 population or over and that the budget as published covered all that was required, but his attention was called to the fact that our Town did not come in the class with cities of 100,000 population.
