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City Council In Regular Meeting

After Being Sworn In As Recorder
Bishop Resigns And Is Then
Appointed Councilman

Monday evening, January 3, the Town Council met in regular session, Mayor Pegg, Councilmen Rossi and Lewis and Recorder Thyng being present as the meeting came to order. It came to order early, early, we leaving home at ten minutes to seven came in after much of the routine part of the meeting had been transacted.

As we entered, apparently, bills were being considered by the finance committee. After these papers were turned back to the recorder, he proceeded to administer the oath of office to Mayor-elect Pegg, and to the Councilmen-elect Raynard and Wilson who took their obligation and sat down where they had been sitting among the spectators. Recorder-elect Bishop was then sworn in and he also sat down in the chair he had been occupying.

Came then an embarrassed moment until Recorder Thyng left his seat and sat down near the door. He vacated his seat. Recorder Bishop arose from where he was sitting and stated that he understood there was a vacancy on the Council and that he would like to resign his seat as Recorder if he might be appointed to the vacancy. We believe that it was then Mr. Lewis vacated his chair on the Council and the new men, Raynard and Wilson sat down in the chairs usually used by the members of the council.

With no recorder in the chair Raynard moved to accept Bishop's resignation; Mayor Pegg put the motion and it was declared carried. Raynard then moved the appointment of Mr. Bishop to the Council, again the motion was put and declared carried. Raynard again arose and moved the appointment of former Recorder Thyng as Recorder. Again the motion was put and carried—with no Recorder acting at the time these motions were put. (We may be a little mixed on the chronology here but without notes made at the time it is just a little difficult to follow events one after the other as they occur.)

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted. Recorder Thyng asked that an audit be made of his books and the Council voted to order them audited.

The question of the report being printed came up and in spite of the fact that such a charter as we have requires it (the report) to be printed in a newspaper published in the Town if there is one and in the one published closest to the Town if there is none in it, they voted to have it printed as a circular and mailed to every voter in an envelope. We don't know whether that was intended as a slam at the Review but it has several of the earmarks of such. And did we imagine it or was there a faint smile breaking over the features of Attorney McAlister of Hillsboro who was present all through the meeting?
