A. E. Story was appointed as marshal and Drs. Mason and Welsh as health officers.

A supplementary water bill for September water of \$301 was presented and a notice of the receipt by the recorder of

a December water bill for \$880 caused the Council to have Recorder Thynge ask for a conference between the Town Council and the men in charge of the water supply in Portland.

The City of Portland is now making a claim that the master meter has been out of order since in September though it was understood that it had been repaired. Then the fact of the September and October bills being based on the amount used the same month a year ago, but the December bill being based on an average of the amount used during six summer months caused the Council to decide to have a conference with the officials in Portland.
