President Is to Take a Real Vacation

URING the coming summer
"White Court" at Swampscott,
Mass., will be the White House
of President Coolidge. It is
now being put in order for occupancy
in June.

Telephone and telegraph trunk lines
are being installed; routes to and from
Swampscott for the use of the Presi-
dent are being studied by the secret
service; reservations have been made
for the Presidential staff and an office
is being equipped for their use. Not
since 1910, when President Taft went
to Beverly, Mass. for the summer, has
New England been the headquarters
of a President for an extended period.

It is the President's intention to
take a real vacation at Swampscott.
His official party will be compara-
tively small; there will be an occa-
sional personal friend who will visit
the President and Mrs. Coolidge, but
during the first few weeks the only
official callers will be those necessary
to the actual conduct of the govern-
ment's business. The President's per-
sonal party, on leaving Washington,
will probably include only his son,
John Coolidge, who is completing his
first year at Amherst.

Next door to the President is the
summer home of his intimate friend,
Frank W. Stearns, who will occupy it

while the President is at "White
Court." Upon his arrival in Swampscott the
President will immediately prepare his
address for the governors' conference
at Poland Springs, Maine, late in June
and for the one hundred and fiftieth
anniversary of Washington assuming
command of the Continental army at
Cambridge on July 3. Apart from that
the President has no plans other than
to place his chair on the front porch
and read a number of books, notably
biographies.

A number of Washington correspond-
ents will set up headquarters half a
mile away and keep in touch with his
official acts, but otherwise will not
disturb him.

This is the first time President Cool-
idge has taken a real vacation in two
years. He has worked steadily for
long hours each day ever since he en-
tered the White House.

The Presidential yacht, the May-
flower, will anchor in Marblehead har-
bor and the President will take an oc-
casional short trip on the water.

Aside from a week's tour of the New
England coast on the Mayflower and a
visit of a week with his father at
Plymouth, Vt., the President has
planned no extended absence from
Swampscott during the entire summer.

First Winners in Peace Time of D. S. M.
AL FREDERICK L. MARTIN,
first commander of the army
world flyers' expedition, and
First Lieut. Leigh Wade and
Leslie P. Arnold, members of that ex-
pedition, received the other day their
Distinguished Service medals ever
given for military services performed
in time of peace.

The presentation ceremonies took
place at the War department and were
attended by officials representing the
Army, Navy, State, Treasury, Com-
merce and Post-Office departments. By
special act of congress the medals
were awarded to the eight world flight
officers at the time some of their num-
bers also were made eligible for pro-
motion in rank, but only Major Martin
and the two lieutenants were present.

Addressing the three flyers, Acting
Secretary of War Dwight Davis said
the occasion was marked only by the
absence of Secretary Weeks and his
inability, on account of illness, to
make the presentations in person. He
reminded the aviators that while the
medals were small and possessed little

intrinsic value, they nevertheless were
priceless.

"They were authorized unanimously
by a special act of congress," Mr. Da-
vis said. "Other Americans have been
given Distinguished Service medals for
exceptional services during war, but
no one has ever before been given this
medal for services during peace. They
are presented to you by more than
110,000,000 people of the 48 states of
this great nation. The award is a
most signal honor, and, therefore, ap-
propriate for your most signal accom-
plishment."

He told the flyers that the success
of the flight was not due entirely to
individual skill, but that excellent or-
ganization and timely and effective co-
operation given by other government
departments and officers had been an
important contribution.

In this connection he expressed the
thanks of the army to Major General
Patrick, chief of the army air sec-
tion, who, he said, was "so largely re-
sponsible for the organization, on the
ground, of your triumph in the air."

Spuds Are Scarce Again

YOU will not be able to eat so many
potatoes this year and on an average
you will have to pay more for what
you eat, according to the Sears-
Roebuck Agricultural Foundation.

While there will be 25,000,000 bushels
more potatoes than last year, the
prospective crop of 552,000,000
bushels is still 50,000,000 short
of the five-year average. Farmers
devoted 3,202,000 acres to po-
tatoes this year, the Foundation finds,
and according to the latest of-

ficien reports, these should yield on
the average 110 bushels per acre. In
1925 the yield was only 103.9, while
in 1924 it was 127 bushels. The pres-
ent prospects are for a crop 15 per
cent below normal. Based on studies
over a period of 23 years, the Depart-
ment of Agriculture indicated that
prices will be about 37.5 per cent above
normal, and while prices are expected
to be higher, the extreme high prices
of a year ago are not likely.

Less Hay on Cattle Menu

THERE will be less hay on the live-
stock menu this year, due to the
short hay crop, says the Sears-
Roebuck Agricultural Foundation. Farm-
ers will produce only 78,900,000 tons,
because of the unfavorable weather.

Last year they produced 87,000,000
tons, and the five-year average crop
is 90,000,000 tons, the Foundation
points out. It is true that there are
fewer live stock to consume this year's

hay crop. Most of the crop is eaten
by cattle. Horses and sheep also re-
quire large quantities. This year
farmers devoted 50,080,000 acres to
tame hay crops, such as alfalfa, clover,
timothy and mixed crops. This is a
slight reduction from last year's
acreage. This is expected to yield
134 tons per acre, a smaller yield
than usual.

This Six-Room Bungalow

THERE is much to be said in favor of the one-story dwelling, and when the
floor plan is as expertly arranged as in this Colonial bungalow the usual
objections of lack of privacy and long distances to walk, are avoided.

This house may run either lengthwise or across the width of the lot. The
exterior is of stained grey shingles with either a green shingled or tiled roof.

The trimmings should be white and the shutters green to harmonize
with the roof.

The three bedrooms are well shut
off from the rest of the house. The
large open porch or sunroom can be
made to open off either the living
or dining room. The kitchen has the
desired built-in features, including
the useful breakfast nook.

The cost of this house can be ma-
terially reduced by omitting the
basement and allowing space on the
main floor for a small boiler room.
The walls and roof also are sheathed
with celotex to keep the tempera-
ture at comfort point the year
round.
