As the dog derby will be the most attractive feature of the Banff Winter Carnival held February 9-12 inclusive it is interesting to know about the animals which compete in this outstanding feature. Every day during the summer season the Banff kennel owners visit the Mills kennel and throw from the Banff Springs hotel.

"Say Mister" some one would exclaim "where can we see those dogs eating their frozen fish?" This was the inevitable query from young and old alike as they would point to the huskies chained in the wooden kennels in the shade of the pines by the river.

"They seem terribly disappointed," like states "when I tell them my huskies don't eat fish, neither do they have breakfast, lunch and dinner but only dinner at 6 P. M. on a pound of juicy raw meat."

The word "husky" in the vernacular of the dog-musher means a species of dog with a wolf strain possessing many of the wolf's qualities of endurance. Collies, St. Bernards and other fairly heavy breeds of dogs crossed with a wolf result in the heavier type of husky. All husky breeds stand off from their hide and feet preventing ice balls from forming on their bodies and under foot; a wise provision made for the dumb brutes who cannot help themselves in winter like humans.
